GERMANY HAS A RACE PROBLEM TO SOLVE

Report Submitted on Hydro For Suburbs

Grand View and Echo Place Can Get Power From the Commission at Very Reasonable Cost.

In accordance with petitions sent to the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario, signed by the residents of the Township in the immediate vicinity of the city, for power and street lighting, the commission sent an engineer who investigated the situation, and a report has been received by the township clerk. The district of 70 Parkdale, and Grandview will require 77-100 watt tungsten lamps, which will cost \$12 per lamp, and Echo Place will require at least 36 similar street lights which will cost \$14 per year each.

THIRTEEN HAVE LOST LIVES IN TEXAS FLOOD

Rainfall Added to the Menace To-day—Thousnads Are Rendered Homeless—Towns Cut Off By Water—Sad State of Affairs.

(Canadian Press Despatch) DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 4.—Rainfall continued to-day in the flood districts of central Texas, adding to the menace of high waters, which already have cost 13 lives and about \$1,000,000 property damage. The area of overflowing rivers spread rapidly last night, the most important new point affected being San Antonio. The floods to-day covered portions of nearly every county from San Antonio northward almost to the Panhandle, and from this point eastward to include all the important cities of north and central Texas. Houston, Beaumont and Galveston alone were not threatened. The homeless numbered thousands, but inasmuch as they were divided in small groups throughout the immense flood territory, no serious relief problems were presented. At Belton, where part of the town was cut off by water, baskets of provisions were propelled on telephone wires to flood victims. South Bosque, near Waco, reported that the rise, which did not reach there until yesterday, came in a wall of water about ten feet high. The residents had been warned.

GETTING READY FOR THE HANGING

The hanging of James Taylor, the murderer of Charlie Dawson is little more than a month hence, the date being January 22. Nothing will be done towards having the gallows, which are located in a corridor on the northern section of the jail, put in working order until the hangman takes charge. Who the hangman will be is not known at this date. It has been some time since the death dealing trap has been used and notably it is not in the best of working order. A mechanic will likely be called in to overhaul the affair. The hangman will personally purchase the ropes and put them in place. An inch and a half thick rope generally used.

BANK MANAGER IS KILLED BY A ROBBER

A man who was shot and instantly killed at noon yesterday by a disguised robber, who got away with cash reported to amount to \$10,000, the robber escaped in a livery auto which he apparently commandeered immediately after the shooting. EMMELINE WAS SPIRITED AWAY QUIETLY

Mrs. Pankhurst Arrested And Hustled Into London.

Her Followers Were All Gathered Together But Disappointed.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PLYMOUTH, Eng., Dec. 4.—Contrary to expectation there was no disturbance when Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, was arrested on board the Steamship Majestic on her arrival from New York to-day.

Mrs. Pankhurst was transferred to a tug which had been chartered by the police and taken to Devonport dock yard. The police officers boarded the Majestic as soon as the liner had anchored shortly after noon. The police tug with the prisoner and two officers on board, proceeded directly for Devonport. Every body except the steward and a few of the government dock yard staff were excluded from the ship's deck yard and Mrs. Pankhurst's hands were without incident.

RIGHT ABOUT FACE
