**Family of Four
Wiped Out By
Act of Maniac**

(By Special Wire to The Courier)
CHICAGO, July 6.—A family of
four was wiped out by blows from
an axe in their home in the German
settlement of Blue Island, a suburb,
last night.

The victims were Jacob Neslesla, a
German laborer aged 52, his wife,
their daughter, aged 25 years, and
the latter's infant child. The stiffened
bodies and the blood stained axe
alone remained to outline the story
while the crime was discovered by the
neighbors.

Whether the butchery was the
work of a maniac or of a person seek-
ing revenge, was not disclosed in the
first cursory investigation. It was
learned that the young mother of
the infant had been living away

from her husband, a man named Ham-
ilton and efforts to find him were be-

The murderer, according to Ben-
jamin Nirsch, chief of police of Blue
Island, proceeded with great delibera-
tion. Each swing of the axe appar-
ently carried death with it—death
without even a groan to arouse others
sleeping in the house. Each of the
slain was struck in the head.

**J. W. NESBITT
PASSES AWAY**

Was Member of Wellknown
Firm and Prominently
Connected.

(By Special Wire to The Courier)
HAMILTON, July 6.—J. Wallace
Nesbitt of the firm of Nesbitt, Gault,
Langs and Crosswaite, died at his
home here early this morning after a
long illness. The deceased was a
brother of Wallace Nesbitt, K. C., of
Toronto and E. W. Nesbitt, M. P., of
Woodstock. He was one of the most
distinguished barristers in Canada and
in his early days a noted criminal law-
yer. One of his big cases was the de-
fence of the men charged with the de-
fence of County Treasurer Hyslop
Norwich, Ont., in 1850, and practised
law for a time with the firm of Flet-
cher and Finkle, coming to Hamilton
in 1892 where he formed the firm of
Nesbitt, James, Bicknell, K. C. who
late retired and removed to Toronto,
and John G. Gault. Although he was
a brilliant pleader his delicate health
for many years prevented him from
doing much work in the courts, but
his advice was sought in big financial
transactions up to the time illness
forced his retirement. He is survived
by his wife.

**Daring Youth

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 6.—Special
Policeman Frank O'Leary was shot in
the side today by a young man, aged
18, who had just been arrested on sus-
picion of breaking into H. J. Mow-
att's drug store.

The shooting took place near

an English-speaking candidate to be
elected mayor of Montreal without a
contest, and promised that if he was
not in Montreal when the election
came on he would return and enter
the fight.

NORTH BAY, Ont., July 6.—An
inquest was held Saturday into the
death of Miss Morrisette of Mattawa
who died of injuries received when
driven by an automobile owned and
driven by David Moreland in which she
was a passenger was upset. All the other
occupants of the car were badly
hurt to attend the inquest, and none
of those who testified were actual
witnesses of the accident, but basing
their conclusions on the evidence of
those who had seen the car pass some
time previous to the accident, the
jury brought in a verdict of death
caused by reckless driving.
