MAYOR ROWLEY ON BRANTFORD'S SHARE IN WAR

Recapitulation Given By His Worship at Request of Toronto Paper.

Mayor Rowley, in common with the chief magistrates of prominent cities throughout the province, was asked by the Toronto News, on the anniversary of the war, for a recapitulation of the work done by this city since then. Mayor Rowley's statement is as follows:—

"You ask me to outline the work done by the people of Brantford during the past two years. My reply is: 'The people of Brantford and Brant County have endeavored to do their full duty to their King and country.'"

"Out of a population aggregating about 50,000, upwards of 2,500 men have donned the King's uniform to fight for the Empire to uphold our flag and the cause of honor, truth and justice. And when the bugle sounded the call to arms in August, 1914, there was an immediate response to such call, followed by a steady stream ever since."

"The first Brant County battalion the 125th, under Lieut.-Col. Cutcliffe, also the 56th battery, are now making ready to cross the sea, and the 2nd Brant County Battalion, under Lieut.-Col. Harry Cockshutt, expects shortly to leave for training at Niagara."

"Mention should especially be made of the work inaugurated and carried on by the women of all classes in connection with preparing and forwarding comforts and supplies for the men at the front."

"Contributions to the National Patriotic Fund, the Red Cross, the Belgian Relief, and to all other funds of like character, have been liberal and the amount at the time of writing to a sum as near as may be, \$350,000. This is exclusive of private offerings, which will amount to a further sum."

"This municipality, under the direction of my predecessor, Mr. John H. Spence, to whom all honor is due in that behalf, was the first to establish a fund for the purpose of caring for the dependants of men who have been killed or maimed in the war. We shall see more and more separation allowance and monthly pay."

"After a thorough canvass of various points throughout Western Canada, Dr. McMillan is quoted in Calgary as saying that Alberta would have a crop as good as last year, that Dominion would have a billion dollar grain crop and that the grain crop of the three Prairie provinces would be little, if any, behind that of last year."

"The country as a whole never looked better than it does at present," said Dr. McMillan. "The weather was made to order, as you might say, and I am of the opinion that this year's harvest will be another wonderful one."

"Those who contemplate going West will do well to remember that the Canadian climate is not their highest effort. The C.N.R. and that this season they can travel from their home districts to destination Canadian Northern all the way."

THE EARTH NOT YET IS TO BE DIVIDED UP

German Writer Warns His Countrymen of Dark Days to Come.

BRITAIN STILL POWERFUL

The Face of London Shows No Fear, and England's Army Grows.

Rotterdam, Aug. 7.—Maximilian Harding, writing in Die Zukunft, says: "This war is a question of the power of impotence, perhaps of deciding its existence or non-existence."

"What pressure could force a quick conclusion of peace? 'If Russia lost all her Polish territories, she would go back and have the conqueror to follow her, perhaps even to Vindolovo. It is said that France could be forced to lodge and feed our armies and to suffer German authority, but there are her colonies. You can only take them when you have deprived Britain of her strength.'"

"How can you deprive Britain of her strength? Favor, or accident, might bring about a revolution in India, a Turkish invasion at Britain or a sea battle which would not leave so much to Britain as she now has. We shall see the ships of France and Japan, to patch up something like a fleet of a great power."

"Yet Britain is not even suffering yet. London's face has shown no fear. Suez, damage by fire, mass strikes in Britain or a sea battle which would not leave so much to Britain as she now has. We shall see the ships of France and Japan, to patch up something like a fleet of a great power."

"We are not yet at the goal of hindrances of all kinds that may face our armies. All we can do is to make sure that our armies lack nothing they desire. We shall see more naked misery and hard need in the third year than in many ordinary years."

"Reign yourselves to the different times. Do not imagine that you are already at the beginning of the end, and joyfully commence dividing up the earth. A decision can only be secured by challenging the cold-blooded British."

"Britain has great embattled armies in the field. Both western powers have said that their present offensives are their highest effort, and according to our experience a still more furious offensive will follow."

"No, the earth is not to be divided yet!"

DEUTSCHLAND HAS NOT PUT TO SEA AS YET

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 6.—British authorities here declare that the German super-submersible Deutschland has not yet actually gone to sea.

The claim is based on the fact that the sounding apparatus on the British warships has not detected the submarine passing. It is declared that the "listeners" would have recorded the presence of the submarine had she been within ten miles of a warship.

There is a report in marine circles here that the Deutschland is hiding in the bay, after having made as if to start out to sea.

INJURY TO HEEL CAUSED LOCKJAW

Windsor, Aug. 7.—After more than 48 hours of agony from tetanus, death relieved the sufferings of Chas. A. Zimmerman, a Sandwich man, early Saturday morning. About a week ago Zimmerman injured the heel of his right foot while riding a motorcycle, and two days later symptoms of acute infection developed.

He was given the best medical attention, but when on Friday the victim's jaws locked and he exhibited other decided symptoms of tetanus, hope was abandoned and death ensued early Saturday morning.

Zimmerman was 35 years old, and leaves a widow and three children.

Water Works Notice

Change in Hours for Sprinkling Lawns

No person or persons shall be allowed to sprinkle, or use in any manner whatsoever, the water supplied by the Board of Water Commissioners upon LAWNS, GARDENS, YARDS or GROUNDS OF ANY DESCRIPTION for the Section North of the G. T. R. known as Terrace Hill, and that portion of the City East of Clarence Street and North of Colborne St. except between the hours of 7.30 and 9 p.m. The balance of the city between the hours of 6 and 7.30 p.m., excepting on lawns of 5,000 square feet and over, consumers are permitted to commence one hour earlier in each instance, and any person wishing to use the water on their lawns or gardens in the mornings in place of the evening may do so between the hours of 6 and 8 a.m. by giving notice to that effect in writing to the Secretary.

It must, however, be clearly understood that the water cannot be used on lawns or grounds both morning and evening. City time to govern in all cases.

The commissioners ask the support and co-operation of consumers in carrying out these regulations, owing to the exceptional strain upon the Works.
