LONGBOAT BEATS SHRUBB

The Canadian Indian Wins in the Marathon Race Held in Madison Square Garden—Shrubb Was at One Time Eight Laps Ahead.

Madison Square Garden, New York Feb. 5.—Longboat won the great Marathon here tonight. Shrubb collapsing at the 24th mile.

Shrubb's running was a revelation to the spectators, who continually cheered the flying Englishman, who moved around the track with machine like motion that carried him steadily away from Longboat.

The Indian sought facility to cut down his adversary's lead, but Shrubb showed no traces of weariness, and continued his fast pace undiminished.

Unable to keep up Longboat dropped his sprint, and fell back to his old pace, with the result that Shrubb secured a lead of seven laps at the seventeenth mile. During the running of the 12 and 20th mile, Shrubb put on a fine burst of speed, and though the Indian responded gamely, he put the eighth lap between himself and Longboat.

The time for the twenty mile mark was 2 hrs., 1 min. and 55.4-5 seconds. At this point Shrubb commenced to weaken, and at the 24th mile Longboat had almost gained the lost lead. Longboat finished the race in 2:53:40-2-5.

Although the Indian ran the greater part of the last three miles alone, his time for the whole distance was better by nearly a minute than that of Dorando in the London Olympic, when owing to a collapse he was beaten with only a few yards by Hayes.

Pittsburg, Feb. 5.—Secretary Wilnot of the Carnegie hero commission had the question put to him whether Capt. Sealy of the steamer Republic and Jack Binns, the wireless operator, were entitled to Carnegie medals.

It appears from the rules laid down by Andrew Carnegie that both are ruled out. Medals and rewards can only be granted to persons doing some deed of heroism in America.

The steamer Republic was outside the 3-mile limit when she foundered. There has recently been a Carnegie hero fund established, and if it can be construed that Sealy and Binns were on British soil when under the British flag, the British commission may have an opportunity to reward them.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—The railway commission has made a drastic order relating to the charges made by railroads for stop-over privileges of grain in transit.

It frequently occurs that shippers will send out train loads and get it on its way without determining first its destination. For instance, it is often sent out of Fort William and held at Carleton Place for several days waiting orders.

On these stop-overs have been cleared one cent per 100 pounds, which is equivalent to about 37 or 38 per cent for each car. Upon investigation of the complaints the board has ordered that the charge shall be reduced to 25c per day for each car. This will be for the first two days. After that the regular demurrage rate of 51c per day will hold.

ASPHYXIATED IN WELL Togo, Sask., Feb. 3.—An accident occurred about 1 mile from Markham, resulting in the death of Frederick Rogers, a well known and popular young man in the district.

He and his brothers were engaged in digging a sixty-foot well, when a small flow of mineral gas was discovered. Frederick came up out of the well extending the time for construction of the branches already authorized, including one northerly to Prince Albert from 32-31 west, 2nd meridian from Pheasant Hills, branch towards the Battle River, thence westerly and southwesterly to 36, 12 west 4, from about 29, 5, west 3rd; westerly or northerly to the terminus of the Lacombe branch of the Calgary and Edmonton railway. From Weyburn, westerly from Estevan to 31, 12 west 3rd; from about 7, 30, west 4, westerly to connect with the Crow's Nest Pass branch between 8 range 16 west 4th and Lethbridge. Also for authorizing the company to construct a line from a point on the revision of the Crow's Nest Pass line 9, 22, west 4th, in a northerly and northwesterly direction to a point of junction of the Macleod branch of the Calgary and Edmonton railway, at or near Alderside, Alberta, a distance of about 35 miles.

RECOUP GRAIN GROWERS Winnipeg, Feb. 3.—Yesterday morning the railway commission considered the grain growers contention that a shipper be promptly and suitably recouped, when obliged to put grain doors in a car. The railway lawyers contended that it is impossible in a big corporation to permit local agents to make purchases, and the charges not fixed. They therefore billed 33, which they thought was reasonable up to 35. The commission ordered that the following charges be allowed: farmers, who supply grain doors in the prairie provinces. Lower door \$1, and upper door 50c. To be settled by the nearest agent of the company in cash or be deducted from the freight charges. The application of the Kemp Manufacturing Co., and the Winnipeg Ceiling and Roofing Co., to have freight rates on metallic shingles and sidings from eastern points to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, equalised as against freight rates charged on

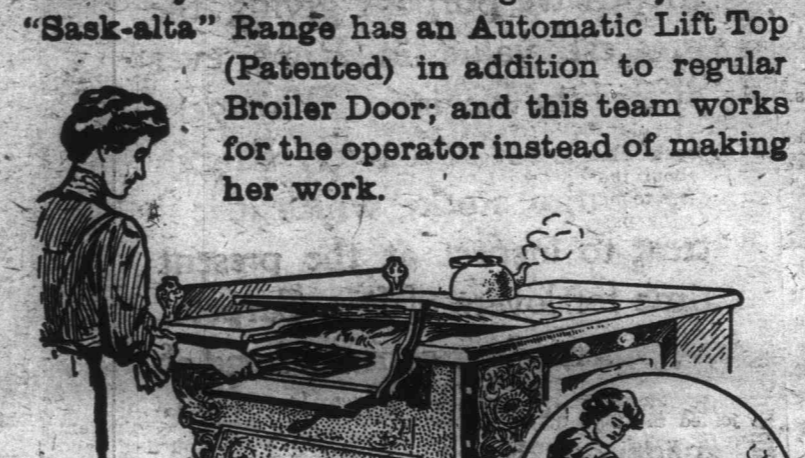

AFTER BEEF TRUST Chicago, Feb. 5.—It was learned today that the United States government is again attacking the powerful beef trust. The second enquiry was recently begun in this city, since, under direct orders from President Roosevelt, plans to indict every beef magnate in Chicago. The Washington orders are to permit "no guilty man to escape."

It was generally believed that the present federal grand jury hearing will only rebuke the charges against the Nelson Morris company, but gradually the inquiry has broadened to every packing house. It is charged that a greater combine than ever before has been revealed. So important has been the discovery of Sims and his assistant, Milkerson, that they rushed to Washington to report to the attorney general.

THIRD TRANSCONTINENTAL Chicago, Feb. 5.—The Canadian Northern railroad has decided to enter into competition with the Canadian Pacific railway by extending a third transcontinental road across Canada. Announcement has been received in Chicago that the powerful Mackenzie & Mann interests that have been so potent a factor in the development of Canada would extend this line to Vancouver on the Pacific coast. Arrangements satisfactory to the directors of the railway have been made with the province of British Columbia, it is stated, and the line will be constructed from Edmonton, the western terminus of the Canadian Northern, through British Columbia by way of Yellow Head Pass down the north Thompson river to the junction with the Fraser river, thence to New Westminster, B.C., and on to Vancouver.

LAKE GIVES WARNING Toronto, Feb. 4.—A note of warning for Canada to be prepared to resist invasion on the Pacific coast was sounded by General Lake, in presenting the Dominion Rifle Association trophy to the University

of Toronto Rifle Association. He said that now Japan and China had become awakened to national greatness and that India was destined to become a nation in the new century, these densely populated countries would look for a place to expand and in all probability would cast their eyes in the direction of Canada. Continuing General Lake said he would like to see Canada spend more money on militia. It was quite impossible for the present recruit to become efficient with the training afforded him. If Canada was to have an army fit and capable of defence, the men personally must become interested and a university and collegiate institute and cadet corps must provide training.

MATHESON FOR PRIMATE In the opinion of Archbishop Fortin, of Holy Trinity, Archbishop Matheson will be the next primate of all Canada. This opinion was expressed to a Tribune representative yesterday, and the Archbishop explained the method that will be gone through to elect the Primate. The first steps to be taken will be the election by the synod of Toronto of a bishop to succeed Archbishop Sweetman, who was head of that diocese. Then the Bishops of eastern Canada will meet and elect an Archbishop, and finally the archbishops of Canada, and the two British Columbia Bishops, who have not yet joined either of the church provinces, will meet and elect a primate. Archbishop Fortin believes that the choice will fall on Archbishop Matheson, as he will be the senior Archbishop at the conference. The Bishop of Ottawa is looked upon as the choice for archbishop in the east—Winnipeg Tribune.
