# BRITISH PRISONERS.

President Kruger Says no Differ ence is Made in the Treatment of Colonials and Regulars.

London, May 15.-The war office has published a despatch from Lord Rob-erts, dated Kroonstadt, Sunday, May 13th, giving the correspondence be-tween Lord Roberts and President Kruger relative, to the alleged ill-Kruger relative, to the alleged in-treatment of colonial prisoners of war. The Transvial's reply was to the effect that there was no dif-ference in the treatment of the col-onial and other prisoners, and that only a few who had contravened mar-tial iaw or who had tried to escape, tial law or who had tried to escape, or who it had been suspected might try to escape, had been placed in jail for security. Otherwise they had been treated like the other prisoners of war. Regarding enteric fever, the government of the Transvaal said it was prevalent among the civil population as well as among the risoners. was prevalent among the cavit population, as well as among the prisoners, and every remedial measure had been taken. Lord Roberts replied on April 22 that he was glad to receive President Kruger's assurances, but pointed out that no difference was made by the British authorities in record to the Boer prisoners, against gard to the Boer prisoners, against reasonable ground for suspicion that they would try to escape, adding that such ex-ceptions gave room for abuse by offi-cials without the knowledge of the

BULLER PUSHING ON.

London, May 15.—A special dispatch from Stone Hill Farm, Natal, says:— Gen. Buller's advance commenced on

Gen. Buller's advance commenced on Thursday, when he left Ladysmath in strength. When within two miles of Helpmakaar the Boers opened a heavy heavy artillery fire and the British guns replied, while a postion of Buller's troops worked round the Boer flanks. The British attack was pressed home Sunday. Bethune, on the right outflanked the Boers, whose splendid defensive positions on the Biggarsberg, were practically taken. General Buller's march, subsequent to the attack, was carried out without a hitch. The British are still pushing on.

London, Tuesday, May 15, 4 a. m.-While Lord Roberts' infantry are concentrating at Kroonstadt, where they will rest for a day or two, his horsemen have penetrated 18 miles northward. In the squadron which cut the railway 15 miles beyond Kroonstadt was the American scout, Frederick Burnham. Two hundred Boers, who had hidden in the river jungles near Kroonstadt to escape service, have surrendered to the British and taken

the oath of allegiance. According to a despatch from Bennett Burleigh to the Daily Telegraph, dated May 10, Paul Botha and Mc-Donald, members of the Free State
Volksraad, demanded that the chairman should call a meeting to sue for
peace, as further resistance was suicidal, and proposed to make President
Steyn a prisoner. East of Bloemfontein Gen Rundle, is advancing toward Ladybrand. His troops and those of Gen. Brabant are stretched over a distance of 30 milesy. The Boers are described as quite disorganized and as retreating northward. President Steyn's lieutenants are trying t orally them. Mr. Steynekamp, chairman of the second Raad, who travelled with me, said that if the burghers were pressed from Pretoria they would retire to the district of the Lydenburg mountains, which had already been provisioned. He remarked that he hoped the burghers would stand firm, but he feared they were too broken in spirit. THE WHITE FLAG AGAIN. London, May 15.—The War Office has received the following, despatch from Lord Roberts:—"Kroonstadt, Sanday, May 13.—There were more casualties in the cavalry division May 10 than reported to me. I have been unable to get an exact account of what occurred, as the commanding of what occurred, as the commanding officer, Capt. Elsworthy, was killed, and two officers were wounded at the same time, and have been sent to the rear. But it would appear that a party of our men, going up to a kraal on which a white flag was flying, was suddenly attacked by a large number of the enemy. Two officers—Captain Haig, of the Sixth Dragoons, and Lieut. Wilkinson, of the Australian Horse, were made prisoners, and 21 men are still unaccounted for. Some of them may have turned up, as the
