One of the most spirited and picturesque of modern romances is "Rupert of Hentzau," Anthony Hope's famous tale of love, hatred and intrigue, which is to be seen at the Grand Opera House on Monday, September 15th.

Atmosphere and action are essentials demanded in a modern romantic play, and Anthony Hope's story appears to possess both qualities in overflowing measure. It is the novelty and charm of these characteristics that makes it the tremendous success it is, both as a book and on the stage.

"Rupert of Hentzau" is a particularly characteristic Hope romance. The story concerns itself with the fate of a compromising letter which Queen Flavia of Ruritania has sent to Rudolf Russendyll, and which has been seized by Count Rupert of Hentzau.

The latter purports to accomplish the disgrace and ruin of the Queen, together with his own reinstatement in position and fortune, by placing the letter in the hands of the King. The proceedings of Rudolf in his pursuit and recovery of the compromising letter, and his destruction of her enemy who is also his own wily and inveterate antagonist—are well recounted in the action of the drama, and are made to provide opportunities for spirited acting, and for impressive scenic pictures. The incidents follow rapidly one upon another, the situations are novel and often startling in their development, and the climax is unique and imposing.
