The football boys are awaiting the result of the Sandwich-Windsor-Detroit games. They are practicing every night and keeping in good shape. Arrangements are being made for an exhibition game with St. Thomas in that town on June 19. Thursday they will play with the all-Dover team on the grounds on the 13th concession. For this game Manager Williams, of the Sovereign Bank, has offered a prize of \$11 to the winning team.

THE TRACK

Secretary Massey is authority for the statement that some very good money will be hung up Chatham way on July 2. The best horseflesh in Canada will be here. The Windsor meet ends the last week in June and this will mean that the best in the land will be steered this way for the holiday. There will be two harness races, and two running races. A word about the players. Some very comely and clever fellows are being signed. A look over the list will show the odd-time that a few of these who formed the famous Tecumseh line-up are still doing business at the old stand.

To begin with, we have Johnson in goal. Johnson hails from Hespeler, the town noted for its factory girls and Bernhardt's lager. But Johnson, they say, is a dandy. He is not new to these pastures, and his good work here on the 24th has made him solid with the crowd.

Point will be granted by O'Keefe, a bunch of vim and muscle from Wallaceburg, who signed last year with the Tecumsehs, but eventually cast his lot with the Glasstown aggregation. O'Keefe has a pretty broad acquaintance with the Chatham oval. He has had experience in the east, having played one season in Montreal.

Cooper gained notoriety here last winter as a lucky player, and hockey and lacrosse, according to the sporting proverb that be, go hand in hand.

Miner, who is a new one here, is showing up in fine practice. Walter Elliott will do stunts again this season. Elliott needs no newspaper boost. He's got a "rep." in this town, and in fact in every other town where he has played, of being one of the very cleanest and neatest of the business. Walter's a regular lion with the lovers of the game.

Lawson has always played home, but he is a born defence man, and that's where he'll be seen during the coming months of roses and Scotch tipples. He is a speedy boy, and he will undoubtedly shine on defence.

Travel a little further down the line and we have Hutchison. Still waters run deep. Hutchison is one of the deep kind. He's a heady boy, and he keeps the other fellow wondering what he is going to do next.

R. Johnson, who will likely hold down centre, comes from St. Thomas. He played with the Intermediates there and has a splendid record.

Higley, of Blenheim, is another whose face is familiar on a Chatham line-up. He is a pretty stick handler, and he knows the game.

Bob Stewart don't need any puff. He is an old favorite in these parts. Fairfield is small in stature, but he is wiry and slippery, and he has his field of action.

Richards is a pacer and a hard worker. He has the name of being a dead shot on goal, when he gets the opportunity. He is no quitter, and has barrels of staying power.

Manroe has all the earmarks of an A1 home. Poole is a Chatham boy with a good record, as are also the Messrs. Brundage.

Kenn is yet an unknown, as he hasn't turned up to practice so far. Johnson, of Wallaceburg, is a defence man of no mean "rep."

Davidson made a strong bid for popular favor in the game on Victoria Day, and he is an effective shot. He formerly played with Thamesville.

The Wallaceburg Intermediate bunch have quit the business, and therefore the bunch from Sugarville will not set the Thames on fire this season. The idea now is, to get Detroit to take Wallaceburg's place in the gap. Detroit would help to fill up the schedule most acceptably, shown not only by their game here on the 24th, but also in their recent defeat of Windsor by a score of 3-0.

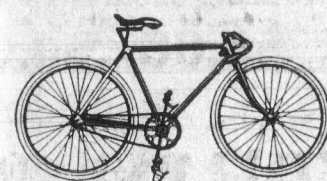
