PRINCE CHARLES MAY TAKE THIS TITLE AS RULER OF NORWAY.

What His Election to This Scandinavian Throne May Mean—Offensive and Defensive Alliance Possible Between Sweden, Norway and Denmark—His Powerful Connection With Several Other Crowned Heads of Europe.

Prince Charles of Denmark will become the first king of independent Norway and this will doubtless mean a close alliance between the new kingdom and that of Denmark and possibly an offensive and defensive alliance to which Sweden, Norway and Denmark will all be parties. Prince Charles is the second son of the late Prince Frederick of Denmark; is a son

in-law of the King of England, a nephew of the King of Greece, a cousin of the Czar of Russia and a grandnephew of Oscar of Sweden. His mother is a niece of King Oscar. There is a story that she wished very much to marry her son Charles to Queen Wilhelmina of Holland and was exceedingly put out when he declined to consider this matrimonial proposition and picked out as his bride the vivacious and witty daughter of King Edward of England, the Princess Maud. The two were first cousins and were ardently in love with each other, and King Edward, then Prince of Wales, was delighted that his favorite daughter had chosen for a husband so many and handsome a man as Prince Charles. They were married in 1896, when the Prince was twenty-three and his bride twenty-six. A son, the Prince Alexander, was born in 1902. When the happy pair went to live in Copenhagen the Crown Prince was quite uncomfortable for her new daughter-in-law, with the result that Prince and Princess Charles have passed most of their time in England, at the estate near Sandringham palace.
