Financial Letter.

The news of the death at Rome of the noted financier, J. Pierpont Morgan, reached New York bankers an hour before the Stock Exchange opened last Monday morning. It was generally thought that this would have a seriously depressing effect on the market, but the bankers were fortified against the anticipated 'bear' raids, and the various stocks maintained their strength—although the trading was dull.

The Montreal stock market showed considerable strength early this week, the gain in Richelieu & Ontario being the chief feature. C. P. R. holds firm between 234 and 235; the stimulating factor is the internationally-traded stock being the resuscitating of an early settlement of the Balkan war.

The Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company report that contracts have been taken for their entire output of iron ore for the current year at favorable rates, and the output of steel for the first six months of their fiscal year has also been disposed of at an substantial increase over last year's rates; the market for coal is also good, and both the tonnage and prices are expected to exceed those of last year. All things considered, the outlook for the present year is decidedly promising, and the earnings should considerably exceed those of 1912.

The annual report of the Porto Rico Telephone Company, just to hand, makes a very satisfactory showing. After providing for bond interest, depreciation and sinking fund, the net earnings for 1912 were \$13,000—or over eight per cent. on the \$150,000 outstanding stock. A considerable number of the bonds are held by Maritime investors, and it must be gratifying for the holders to know that the company is doing so well.
