### Two-Horse Load of 88 Barrels

E. J. Dorsey's team on Saturday hauled from Mr. Dorsey's farm, two miles north of Fort Fairfield village, to the C. P. R. depot in this village, on a Peterson wagon, 88 barrels. This is the biggest two-horse load of barrels of potatoes that we have ever heard of on one wagon. We have heard of rather more potatoes on one wagon in one or two cases, but they were in sacks. If anybody knows of more barrels of potatoes, in barrels, upon two-horse wagon anywhere, we should like to be informed of the fact. When loading these potatoes a mistake was made in counting, and the number was called 80 barrels, but they were sold to James Dorsey at the C. P. R. station and he counted them out and found there were 88. It takes a good wagon to stand up under a load of nearly nine tons, but Mr. Peterson warranted this wagon to Mr. Dorsey for five years, and seems to have lots of faith that it will stand up to the business every time.
