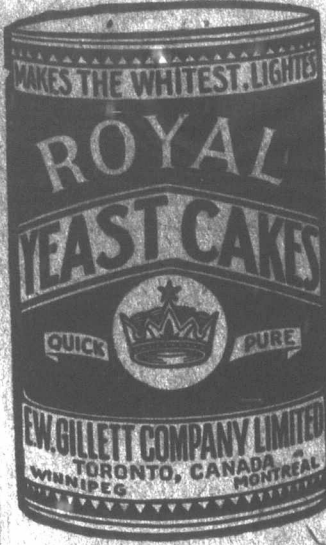

B. H. Kimball

Birdin Hannibal Kimball, one of the large farmers of Fort Fairfield and one of its most respected



and much loved citizens, died Monday afternoon.

Mr. Kimball was born in Jacksontown, July 5, 1863, and was therefore not much over 56 years of age at his death. He was the son of the late Jedediah and Eliza Kimball.

December 19, 1888, Mr. Kimball married Miss Minnie Savage of Jacksontown, going to Fort Fairfield with his family the following year and buying a farm on the Centre Limestone road, which he owned at the time of his death and upon which he had made a great deal of honest money.

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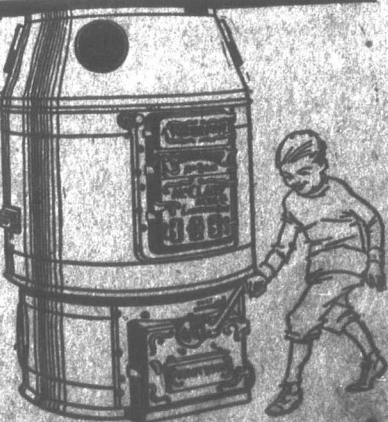
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
