LEADERS OF THE NORTHWESTERN LEAGUE

Ted Kaylor, the fleet-footed little Spokane outfielder, is leading the Northwestern League in batting with a mark of .341, one point better than that of Ken Williams, formerly of Spokane, now of the Cincinnati Reds. Kaylor has been moving up rapidly the last few weeks and has finally crawled over the high water mark set by Williams. Jack Smith, on the other hand has slumped slightly. Ed Kippert is another whose hard clouting lately has seen his name go shooting toward the top in this column.

Eddie Johnson, of Tacoma, still leads in run getting, with ninety completed circuits, while Kaylor is running Smith a neck-and-neck race for second place.

Smith has passed Williams' base stealing total, finally six weeks after Williams has become a National leaguer. Jimmy Lewis and Rod Murphy are close on Williams' total of thirty-five for second place.

Dode Brinker is the home run king of the organization, with nine four-sack swats to his credit. Frisk is second with seven.

Ira Colwell, whom Bob Brown is having a hard time selling, despite his fine record, is leading the Northwestern League pitchers, with twenty one wins in thirty-one games, and Noyes is second, just one game behind, in the same number pitched.

M'FARLAND IS A HEAVY PUNCHER

The record book shows that Packey McFarland, who meets Gibbons next week, is a harder puncher than Gibbons. He has knocked out more men than any boxer except Joe Gans. In actual numbers, Gans put more men to sleep than did McFarland, but figuring it on a percentage basis, Packey's record is better than that of Gans, and far superior to Gibbons. This declaration may astonish many fans but the record books will certify the figures.

Gans fought approximately 154 fights. In fifty-four of these he has his opponent for the full ten seconds count, which gave him a "batting average" of .324.

McFarland has fought 118 fights to date. He has scored sixty-eight knock outs. The percentage is .568.

Gibbons has engaged in the total of seventy-eight battles and has knocked out twenty-five men. His average is .320. It should be noted, however, that McFarland has four more years in the game, although in years Gibbons is the elder by four months.

BAT. NELSON BEATEN.

Juarez, Mex., Sept. 7.—Bobby Waugh, of Dallas, Tex., was awarded the decision over Battling Nelson former lightweight champion, at the end of a twenty-round bout last evening. The fight was fast throughout, Nelson showing all his old-time ability to assimilate punishment, but lacking both steam and cleverness necessary to cope with his younger and more agile opponent.

GERMAN AIR RAID ON ENGLISH COAST

London, Sept. 7.—A German air raid on the east coast of England occurred last night. An official statement regarding the raid says: "Hostile air craft revisited eastern countries Tuesday night and dropped bombs. It is known that there have been some fires and some casualties, but particulars are not yet available. The number of casualties will be communicated to the press as soon as they can be obtained."

NATIONALS CHAMPIONS.

Montreal, Sept. 7.—The championship of the N.L.U. was won today by the Nationals of Montreal by a margin of a few points over the Montrealers when Nationals defeated Shamrocks, the tall-enders by a score of 11 to 3. The game was dull and featureless. Cornwall, the only outside club in the league, stands in third place.

The Nationals will play off with the winner of the Rosedale-Tecumseh series in the Queen City (Toronto) Lacrosse league, the date to be arranged after their final game.

WREATH FROM ENEMY.

Belfort, Sept. 7.—A German aeroplane flying at a great height, appeared last evening over Chavannes an Alsatian village on the old frontier. The aviator dropped a wreath which bore the inscription "To Pegoud, who died like a hero facing his adversary."

The noted French aviator Aolphe Pegoud while making a fight recently was killed by a German aviator whom he attacked.

NORWEGIAN SHIP SUNK.

London, Sept. 7.—It is announced that the Norwegian bark Storesand, which sailed from Iquique, Chile, April 30, for Liverpool, has been sunk. The crew was saved.

STABBED FATHY PASHA.

Cairo, Egypt, Sept. 7.—Fathy Pasha, minister of pious foundations in the Egyptian government was stabbed three times with a knife by an employee of the minister of finance, who attacked him from behind while he was conversing with friends in a Cairo railway station. Fathy Pasha fired with a revolver at his assailant, but missed him. Spectators then seized the man. The wounds of the minister are not serious.

PIONEER BATTALION FROM THE WEST

Ottawa, Sept. 7.—A special battalion of pioneers is to be recruited in Ottawa and other Ontario districts. Another is to be recruited in the west and they will go to the front to be attached to two Canadian divisions there, western battalion to be known as first pioneer battalion and to be attached to the first division, and the eastern battalion is to be known as the second pioneer battalion to be attached to the second division. Both battalions will go to the front as complete units.

ITALIANS EMBARK FOR DARDANELLES

Paris, Sept. 7.—A large force of Italians filling 117 transports, conveyed by sixteen warships, embarked today at Tarento for the Dardanelles, according to a despatch received here today from Rome.

CAPITAL RUINED BY EARTHQUAKE

Laobertad, Salvadore, Sept. 7.—A strong earthquake has occurred in San Salvadore and Guatemala. Jutiapa, capital of a department of the same name in Guatemala has been ruined. In the city of San Salvador no victims have been reported. In Santa Ana there were few casualties. Churches in Santa Ana Sonsonate and other villages of the republic are in ruins.

Jutiapa lies 45 miles southeast of Guatemala City and is the centre of the coffee and cattle trade of the district. Last available records gave Jutiapa a population of about 12,000.

The announcement is authorized that the members of the British Columbia Base Hospital, several of whom were from Nanaimo, have arrived safely in England.
