Nurse Dies in Pittsfield From Mistake Made in Pittsburgh.

Second Operation Fails to Avert Fatal Outcome.

Prout, a trained nurse, died to-day a the House of Mercy Hospital, the victi or an unfortunate surgical operation pe formed in a Pittsburg hospital.

Some time in January Miss Prout was operated upon for the removal of gall-stones. Following the operation she was brought to her home by her mother, Mrs. H. W. Timbie, in Pomeroy avenue, this city. Although the wound healed, it became apparent that there was still something the matter with the patient. Her stomach and other organs refused to perform their functions, and the case baffled the skill of the surgeons of the Pittsfield hospital, who were repeatedly called to diagnose the nurse's case.

It was decided on April 21 again to operate upon Miss Prout, and Dr. C. L. Scudder, a Boston surgeon, came here to use the knife. He was assisted in the operation by Drs. William Paddock, Bruce Paddock, E. N. Taylor and Henry Cole.

In opening the former operation, they found back of the liver a gauze pad which had not been removed when she was operated upon in Pittsburg. This pad was six inches square. Following the last operation the nurse appeared to rally, and for a time there was slight hope that she would live, but gangrene had set in during the time the pad was in her body, and it was the ultimate cause of her death.

Miss Prout was 29 years old, a graduate of the Bishop training school for nurses in Pittsfield, and said to be a skilled nurse. She is survived by her mother, a brother, Charles, in Springfield, and four sisters.
