The Indians who testify before the commission are sworn by Chief Ouray according to the custom of the Ute nation. It Douglass was the first witness called at the order of Ouray. Standing erect with his right arm raised he administered the oath to himself as follows:

By the Heavens above, by the earth that will receive me, by the Great Spirit that looks down upon me, I dare not speak anything but the truth. This was said with much gesture. The oath like all the testimony was translated into Spanish by Ouray, and then into English Douglass was somewhat nervous and very pale, but toward the close of his testimony he regained his composure. He said nothing, heard nothing, and took no part in the killing of Meeker and his employes, or in the first that he was a sensational and without foundation. It was not probable, in his opinion, that so serious a state of affairs could arise so suddenly. Still the rumours might be well founded for anything he knew to the contrary. DREADFUL DISASTER

Great Loss of Life on Lake Ontario.

Sackert's Harbour, N.Y., Nov. 18.—There is great excitement here over the report of a dreadful marine disaster on Lake Ontario last night, and the loss of a large number of lives.

The following particulars have been gleaned from the reports which have come to hand:—
The steam tug Seymour, of Ogdensburg, left Cape Vincent yesterday noon, with a tow consisting of three dredges, two derricks and seven scows, owned by Eckler & Arnold, of Buffalo. She had fine weather until after passing Galloup island, off Sackett's Harbour, where a gale of wind from the north-east, with a heavy snow storm, set in. The tug and tow got within five or six miles of Oswego when she lost the lights, turned around, and endeavoured to hold the fleet until daylight, but ***\(\) fleet broke away and were lost with all hands, excepting six, who were rescued by two tugs.

A Child Eats the Heads of Twenty-Five Matches and Dies.

CARP, Nov. 15.—Last evening a child aged two years, named McGillivray, of Carp village, ate the headsoff twenty five lucifer matches. The parents, not knowing the danger, did not summon medical aid until the morning, seventeen hours after the tatal dose, when Dr. G. H. Groves was called in; but the child was then dying, death occurring in less than an hour.

NAPANER, Nov. 17.—A man named Simon Saider, 70 years of age, was arrested on Saturday afternoor for drunkenness, but was released on a promise that he would leave town. During the night, he found lodging in a barn a mile out of towa, and it wandering about received a kick from a horse, from the effects of which he died in the police station here yesterday afternoon.
