THE LONGUE POINTE HORROR.

Longue Pointe Asylum (St. Jean de Dieu) was completely destroyed by fire on Tuesday. This asylum was situated about five miles from Montreal, down the river, in the village of Longue Pointe. It stood about 200 yards from the main road, in the middle of its own grounds. A broad avenue led from the main gate to the front entrance of the building. It was a very large and handsome brick building, and contained this morning about 1.300 inmates, besides 67 sisters and 100 nurses. 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
