The cotton factory at St. John, N. B., is nearly completed, and the machinery will be fitted up on its arrival from England. It will commence operations in March, with 11,000 spindles, having a capacity for twice that number.

A snow-drift against two sheriff's deputies occurred the other day at the Salmon River Mines in Nova Scotia. The officers, who had been sent to enforce a process of law, were set upon by a gang of between forty and fifty men, beaten, robbed, and thrown into a river.

As the result of an interview lately between Mr. Kranz, M. P. for Waterloo, Ont., and the Minister of Agriculture, and the German Consul, at Montreal, it is probable that a direct line of steamers will be established between Canada and Germany, and immigrants forwarded from the latter country to Manitoba for the sum of \$40.

The steamer Cedar Grove, owned by the New Brunswick Steamship Co., struck on Walker's Head, near Cape Sable, on Wednesday night last, and sank. A lady passenger and a number of the crew were drowned. The Cedar Grove was a new steamer, launched in September last, and was bound from London for Halifax and St. John.

This court martial instituted to inquire into the cause of the wrecking of the British war vessel Phoenix, which went ashore near the East Point of this Island, last September, has found that the vessel was lost through negligent navigation. The court severely reprimanded the commander, and dismissed him from the service. The navigating lieutenant was similarly dismissed.

Mr. F. H. ARNOLD, lately in charge of the Branch of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax, at Summerside, has been appointed General Agent for the several branches of the Bank in this Province, with headquarters at Charlottetown. Mr. W. F. Mitchell again assumes the agency in Summerside, and Mr. W. H. McNeill, son of late Stephen McNeill, Esq., will probably be transferred to the Head Office at Halifax.

M. P. HOGAN, Esq., and family left on Monday morning last, for Baltimore, U. S., where it is probable they may reside permanently. Mr. Hogan lived in Charlottetown for over eight years, where he carried on an extensive lumber business, and acquired a considerable amount of property. He was a prominent member of several national societies, and took a leading and intelligent part in civic matters. He enjoyed the respect of his fellow citizens as a good business man, and his departure is much regretted. We heartily wish Mr. Hogan success in his new home.

The Caladonia Club celebrated the anniversary of their Patron Saint on Thursday evening last, by a dinner at the Bankers' House. About sixty gentlemen sat down to the table. Hon. A. A. Macdonald, presided. The roll of guests included the Lieut. Governor, Provincial Secretary, Col. R. R. Hodgson, J. A. Macdonald, Esq., M. P. F. D. C. Martin, Esq., M. P. F. The Superintendent of Education, and the Patron of the Irish Society. The dinner was served in excellent style, and all present enjoyed themselves until an early hour next morning.

It is said that New Brunswick possesses more railroad mileage, in proportion to its population, than any other province or country in the world. The present railway mileage, including those under construction, and nearly finished, is over 1,000 miles, and the population is estimated at 350,000, which gives one mile of road to every 350 of the population, while the ratio in the United States is about one mile to every 500 of the population, and in England not more than one mile to every 2,000. The present railway mileage of New Brunswick is 984 miles, of which 943 belong to the Intercolonial. The total mileage is expected to exceed 1,000 miles within a few months.
