

The fortune of war had gone in her favor and Russia, recognizing that she had been beaten and preferring peace to the continuation of the war, had agreed to ced upon every point involved in the quarrel. She was willing to allow Japan full swing in Kores, she was willing to get out of Manchuria, bag and baggage, and cominit herself to the recognition of China's integrity and the policy of "the open door."
