"If anyone pretends to acquire this knowledge by dealing with occult spiritual beings; we ans-wer: 'Such things can only have that knowledge if God has retrary to God's ways to reveal such knowledge, except to His own accredited prophets-who must prove that they are really ent by God. If spirits pretend to have such knowledge, they must be evil spirits trying to deceive mankind; and all dealings with evil spirits is treason against God, and forbidden by His Commandments.

"Therefore, if these arts pre tend to be purely scientific, they are to be discredited as frauds and delusions. If they pretend to rest on communication of pirits they are not only fraud. ulent (since the spirits do not possess suck knowledge) but also riminal and offensive to God."
