Politics Again on Exhibition.

Although the proportion of partisan politics is somewhat reduced, and is not so blatant and glaring as that which appeared in the Burin Speech, a large portion of the Premier's speech at St. George's was devoted to a partisan appeal for support at the next General Election, which Sir Edward Morris declared for a second time would take place in the fall of 1913. In order that there may be no doubt in the minds of our readers about this we refer them to the published report of the Speech which appears in the Daily News this morning.

A few words, however, taken from the beginning and end of the concluding paragraph of this report affords clear proof of the partisan complexion of the address. Here they are:—"We intend to stand or fall by our policy two years from now. ... and I am quite confident that, with your high sense of British fair play, you will again honour us with your support."

Whether the Premier likes it or not his party will be judged by its deeds, and the crops of wild oats and weeds have been so prolific during the past three seasons of the Picknickers' sowing that the people at large are highly disgusted, and are only waiting for the opportunity to turn them out neck and crop.

Many people are wondering where the money is to come from for the building of the branches of railroads, contracted for or to which the Pickle Party is committed. So many promises have been made under this head that even Sir Edward himself apparently forgets to mention an odd

branch or so he has promised. It will be remembered that we pointed out in his enumeration of the branch lines to which he was committed, the Premier forgot to mention the one from Stephenville Crossing to Port au Port. We expressed some curiosity at the time whether the same infirmity would strike him at St. George's. Apparently it did so. In the published report of his speech there, no mention of it is made. We suppose it must have been too trivial a matter to be mentioned, although he devoted a considerable portion of his speech to the topic of branch railways, and yet this project, according to the Western Star, was a principal plank in Downey's manifesto, and to it Sir Edward and his party are pledged.

That Outrage at Bell Island.

MR. FRANK THISTLE THE VICTIM.

Yesterday we referred to an outrage on a man at Bell Island Tuesday night, and to-day we find that it was Mr. Frank Thistle who was the victim of the attack. Mr. Thistle is a brother of Mr. John Thistle, Shoemaker, of Water Street, and went to the island to go to work with one of the companies. He has been about 35 years absent from the country, living in New York and was quite a stranger at Bell Island on reaching the place. He returned to the city to-day and told the Telegram that the outrage committed on him was the work of three miners who were either going to or returning from work. He met the men about 7 o'clock and asked them a civil question when they led him along for about 800 yards until he came to the ar tracks when he, without warning, was felled from a blow delivered by one of them. He was then kicked and beaten unmercifully and two of the men held his arms while the third went through his pockets. When he resisted he was kicked into insensibility, had his eyes blackened, lips split and received other injuries about the body and legs. His aggressors took his watch and chain, all the money he had in his pockets and a fountain pen worth \$5. Yesterday he laid the case before Sergt. Cox and Const. Morrissey and will this evening give the facts to I. G. Sullivan.

TRIPOLI, To-day.
There was a combined attack of Arabian horsemen and Turkish cavalry against the Italian lines on Sunday. The main attacking force was assisted by Turkish infantry and small guerilla bands of fierce Arabs, who directed a galling fire from the shelter of trees. The Italians withstood the shock, and then repulsed the enemy, eventually surrounding them and capturing several hundred. The enemy lost several hundred dead and many wounded. The Italian loss is not serious.

PANAMA, Oct. 24.
Dr. Vasquez, a member of the deposed Castro Government, says he has obtained two million dollars in the United States for the purpose of fomenting a revolution against President Gomez of Venezuela. He is leaving Trinidad en route for Venezuela.

PEKIN, Oct. 24.
A state of suspension prevails. Everyone seems to be awaiting the result of General Chang's first encounter with the rebels, who have captured Hankow and fortified the town. The fall of the revolution eastward, Nanking, it is reported, will fall into the hands of the rebels in a few days.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.
It is believed in some quarters that a plebiscite on the Naval Question may be coupled with a General Election two years from now, after the Redistribution Bill has been put through Parliament. Advocates of the plan claim that, with so strong a majority, Premier Borden's Government will run no risk in making the appeal to the people, and that it would come back with its base of power considerably extended.

Prevent Rolling of Steamships.

London, Oct. 25.—The Cunard company is having new anti-rolling devices installed in the Laconia which is being completed at Wallsend. If the experiment proves to be successful similar devices will be fitted in the giant liner Aquitania now building at Clyde bank.
