## The Spirit of St. George.

To-day is St. George's Day. It is the anniversary of the patron Saint of England. St. George is emblematic of the spirit which succors distress and faces and fights gigantic evils with courage and capacity. During the present month many deeds of chivalry and kindness have come to the light of day from our city, our outposts, our kinsmen abroad, that the spirit of St. George animates our people to do their utmost to those now in trouble and distress from the disasters which befall the crews of the Newfoundland and Southern Cross, and it is well to associate it with the spirit of the patron Saint of the senior kingdom of our Empire. But while we may ponder with just pride over this noble quality, it should call to our mind a duty which the legend of St. George enforces. St. George was a fighter. He faced a gigantic dragon. He fought it. He killed it. This of course is emblematic of a spirit which faces almost invincible evil, fights them and overcomes them. We in Newfoundland have a dragon to face and fight and overcome. It is the dragon which devoured 251 of our brave seafarers. We must face it with courage, with all the resources of our mind, with all weapons that knowledge can forge, with all the enactment that a wise legislature may pass, and with all the provisions that the experience of the owners, captains, officers and men of our seafaring venture may suggest. The task is worthy of a St. George. It is worthy of a nation of St. George's. The dragon has exacted an enormous toll in human life. Who is able for it? Answer ye who are animated with the spirit of St. George.

## Cable News.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

The White paper report promissed by Asquith, covering the recent military movement in Ulster was issued last night and makes further startling disclosures. It is divided into three parts, covering correspondence between the War Office and Sir Arthur Paget and other officials relating to the movements of troops, communications between the Admiralty and the fleet, also statement by Paget giving detailed account of an interview with the principal officers. In this statement the Commander-in-Chief for Ireland admits that he alone is responsible for the misunderstanding which arose. The correspondence shows that instructions were issued by the Admiralty to the Vice Admiral commanding the third battle squadron to proceed to Lamlash March 19, but according to the Premier's statement in the Commons this order was given without his knowledge and was countermanded. The Dublin correspondent of the Morning Post asserts that Paget's resignation is imminent. The Times' military correspondent says that Paget's position has been much shaken by the Ulster Unionist Council, although it is understood that the accuracy of certain parts of the statement is denied by Paget's staff. The general impression is that the statement is substantially correct. There is a natural ground for suspicion, adds the correspondent, that such vast development of naval and military forces as that arranged against Ulster should have been arranged on the basis of verbal instruction only. The Cabinet are clearly making great effort to retain him in office, but the general Commander-in-Chief in Ireland will probably realize that in order to maintain his own position tenable his version of his speech to officers must be given to the public without delay.

## Strikers' War.

Three men, two women and a baby are reported to be entombed in a burning mine. Several mining camps were destroyed, others are riddled with bullets. Less than 200 militiamen and a company of guards are confronting an army of strikers, coal miners, estimated by strike leaders at more than four hundred. This was the situation when sunset on the third day in the Southern Colorado labor war. A party of militiamen hastily sent from Ludlow in steel cars and reinforced the guards and after heavy fighting, the strikers were driven back. At Denver, the enrollment of State militia, including all branches of the service, are ordered to mobilize at the two armories in Denver to-night to await further orders for service in the Trinidad strike district.

All papers recognize the magnitude of the possibility opened up by the happening at Vera Cruz. The Morning Post assumes that President Wilson, who has carefully studied the problem, has not yet fully revealed his plans. The Daily Mail Mexico City correspondent says the Cabinet has decided to promulgate a general amnesty, so that all Mexicans may be united in defence of their country.

The celebrant of the Mass was the Rev. T. J. Gough with Rev. Father Pippy and Rev. Fr. Rawlin as Deacon and sub-deacon. There were also present Rt. Rev. Mons. Roche, Fathers McDermott and McGrath. Before giving the final absolution, Mons. Roche referred in sympathetic terms to the recent disaster, especially of the Parish of Torbay, which includes Pouch Cove. While offering prayer for the deceased and invoking the mercies of the Lord in their behalf, we should not forget those who are left behind. That the God of all consolation would lighten their burdens and assuage their sorrows will be the fervent prayer of all.

ST. GEORGE. The tutelary Saint of England, adopted by Edward III. The dragon which he is said to have slain symbolises the powers of evil over which he is credited with having triumphed.

SHAKESPEARE born 1564; died 1616. England's greatest poet and dramatist. It was character and the development of character that interested him; and it is by his prolific creation, not of stage copies, but of men and women, that he has established his position as the supreme poet and interpreter of human life. WORDSWORTH died 1850, aged 80. One of the most inspired of all British bards. In 1802 he married his cousin, Mary Hutchinson and the two with the poet's sister formed an ideal poetic household.
