DIRECTIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF ELECTORS IN VOTING.

Each elector, on entering the room where the poll is being held, shall declare his name, surname, and addition. After so doing he shall receive two ballot papers in the above forms respectively. Each elector, if required by the Deputy Returning Officer, the Poll Clerk, one of the Candidates, or one of their agents shall, before receiving his ballot papers, take an oath of qualification. The voter is to vote only for one candidate for Mayor and for six candidates as Councillors. After receiving the ballot papers the voter shall go into one of the compartments and with a pencil, there provided, place a cross in the division containing the name of the candidate for Mayor, and the six candidates for Councillors, for whom he intends to vote, thus—X. The voter will then fold each ballot paper, so as to show a portion of the back only, with the initials of the Deputy Returning Officer, and shall hand them so folded up to the Deputy Returning Officer, and the Deputy Returning Officer shall, without unfolding them, ascertain that they are the ballot papers which he furnished to the elector, and then immediately place them in the Ballot Box. The voter shall forthwith leave the Polling Station. If a voter inadvertently spoils a ballot paper, he may return it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who will give him another. If a voter votes for more candidates than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the ballot papers by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted. If a voter takes a ballot or ballot paper out of the Polling Station, or fraudulently puts any other paper in to the Ballot Box than the papers given him by the Deputy Returning Officer, he will be subject to punishment by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars or by imprisonment for a time not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour. F. J. DOYLE, Returning Officer. The following is published for the information of the public: ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL ELECTION. QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS. A voter must be a male British subject of the age of 21 years and upwards. He must have resided for one year next preceding the election within the limits of the town of St. John's as

defined in the St. John's Municipal Act, 1902. Being qualified as above, he may vote if he (1) Has occupied a dwelling house within the above limit for the above period; or if he (2) Has been liable to and actually paid rates or assessments to the St. John's Municipal Council as (a) Ground landlord, or (b) Owner, lessee or occupier of any lands, tenements, buildings or any interest therein, or (c) Any other taxes under the St. John's Municipal Act, 1902, or any former Act relating to the Municipal affairs of St. John's. The mere fact of the purchase of Coal upon which a revenue has been paid to the Customs does not in itself qualify the purchaser to vote. F. J. DOYLE, Returning Officer.


