Thoughts Upon the Times.

(By PATRIOT.)

The Government of Newfoundland and the Mayor and Councillors of the city deserve credit for their prompt action in cabling generous donations in money to the relief of the sufferers at Halifax. Prompt financial aid is the best way to show our sympathy when disasters like that which almost blotted out Halifax happen. The whole country should do its best, for not only did the people of Halifax act promptly and generously towards us in the great fire of 1892, but also at the time of the Newfoundland sealing disaster.

The shortage in the coal supply seems to have developed suddenly. It would seem more reasonable had the Government given the trade and public twenty-four hours' notice of their drastic reform. It is nonsense to point out that they warned people last June or July to fill their cellars with coal. Most people can only afford to purchase a few weeks' supply at one time. To cut the quantity down to a quarter of a ton to each person seems absurd. It simply means that the price of coal will advance as the cartage on a quarter ton of coal will cost as much as that on a half ton, and the consumer will have to pay for it. Again, those who have sickness in their homes and have to keep fires going night and day will feel the effects of this insane act. It seems the threatened shortage is not caused by the shortage of tonnage, but the difficulty in obtaining coal at Sydney. This should have been looked into before. Why did the Government wait until Christmas and the cold weather was upon us before springing it upon the people? Why was not Mr. Downey or Mr. Targett or some other member of the much boasted National Government sent over to Sydney to watch the coal supply?

It must be very gratifying to the Canadian Government and people to know that their Victory War Loan has been over subscribed. It reached the three hundred and fifty million dollar mark and there were over half a million subscribers. This is not Canada's first attempt to raise a War Loan among her own people. Her total war loans must now reach over the billion dollar mark. When we consider that she is only a small nation with a population of about eight millions of people, the result is marvellous and speaks much for her patriotism. The Premier, Sir Edward Morris, has sent two cable dispatches to the Minister of Militia which satisfy nobody. There is another side to the story which one can get from the parents of the lads themselves, and there are many answers that will yet have to be given to questions that have not yet appeared in newspapers. By the way, what is the Premier doing in England? Let him come back to Newfoundland and visit his own district or Conception, Trinity or Bonavista Bays and he will hear and see considerable discontent on the part of people who have sons or brothers serving in the Navy, and who claim they are only receiving forty cents a day instead of the dollar and ten which they were promised, and I believe received for two or three months. Why have not these men been paid the same amount as the lads of the Regiment for the past two months? This is a matter which concerns the whole country and the Minister of Militia should investigate and render the country an explanation as soon as possible.
