The commerce and trade of New Brunswick for the last year, as given in the official returns of the Province, appear to have been in a most flourishing and satisfactory condition. The imports for the last fiscal year amounted to \$6,523,395, on which duty was collected to the amount of \$886,586. The imports were chiefly molasses, tea, sugar, coffee, alcoholic liquors, and dry goods. The exports for the year were £4,626,727.


