DEACON WILL BE HERE TO PLAY TONIGHT

His Equinoxes Will Start Up Against Chandler's Crowd On Their Way to Lethbridge.

Tonight at Victoria park Deacon White's Equinoxes will be on exhibition in a ball game with Chandler's bunch. The game will be called at 6:15 sharp, and a big crowd will be out to see what kind of a bunch Deacon has collected.

According to Deacon Deacon is a very strong team. Several players failed to put in an appearance. Only a day or two ago Deacon was phoning Manager Carney to find out what he had done with Lee Wolfe. Burridge wired that he was on his way and is expected in Calgary this morning. Chandler received a telephone message from Burridge promising to meet the train that arrived in the city Monday morning from the east and hold Burridge in Calgary. Should Burridge come on that train, he will play behind the bat and Willett in the outfield.

CARNEY ALL READY FOR MEDICINE HAT

The Men Are in Good Shape and Eager For the Opening Battle on Wednesday.

The baseball game between the professionals and Chan's semi-pros, scheduled for Saturday afternoon, was postponed through the weather man butting in. While it cleared away in the afternoon it was somewhat uncomfortable and chilly, and Carney did not feel like taking any unnecessary chances of his men catching cold.

It is expected that Harry Rush will play on the Calgary team. Manager Bill needs another pitcher, and he can get Rush, who is with Vancouver. Rush pitched here the last part of 1909 season, but he was not in very good shape. When he is feeling right, he is there with everything, and can hold his own with any of them in this league. He has been working out all this year with Vancouver, and is in good shape. Under Carney and a catcher of Matt Stanley's class, he should do good work in this league during the coming season.

Most of the boys are feeling better, and getting more used to this bracing climate. Gehan's sore arm is better, and should be well again in a day or two.

With the opening of the league series only two days off, the boys are looking forward with considerable interest for Wednesday, when they attack up against Medicine Hat. The players are anxious to get into the game for many reasons. First, they would rather play ball than trot out on the park twice a day; also they want to get a line on this strong Hat team under the leadership of Manager Billy Hamilton. These are not the chief reasons, however. Oh, no! As soon as the league starts, the pay starts, and that's one thing that makes life worth living.

The players are confident they can hold their own with the other teams in the league from day to day.
