The Shivering Earth. Vienna, Oct. 24.—Earthquake shocks were felt in Bosnia and Corinthia yesterday.

No Wonder. Edinburgh, Oct. 24.—Mr. Gladstone is greatly elated by the return of a Liberal from Russia, and to every one who speaks to him on the subject he expresses his delight at the great victory his party has won.

New Cotton-Raising Scheme. St. Petersburg, Oct. 24.—A company of Russian and Berlin capitalists has been organized to engage in cotton planting on Amur Daria and Central Asia. The capital is \$5,000,000.

Accident to Lord Dunlop. London, Oct. 24.—Lord Dunlop, the husband of Belle Belton, the concert hall singer, whose matrimonial difficulties have been the subject of much discussion, both in the courts and among the general public, was thrown from his horse while riding yesterday and one of his shoulders was dislocated.

Fighting Inevitable. Zanzibar, Oct. 24.—The Sultan of Zanzibar has refused to surrender to the British authorities or offer reasons for the recent massacre. On the contrary, he is actively preparing for hostilities. He has ordered his troops to surround the British camp and to his standard. Fighting is inevitable.

Newfoundland's Grievance. London, Oct. 24.—It is semi-officially stated that the negotiations between France and England relative to the Newfoundland fisheries will not be resumed until M. Waddington, the French Ambassador in London, who is at present absent from his post, returns to London.

Delphic Delving. Athens, Oct. 24.—The proposed grant by the French Government for the excavations of the ancient city of Delphi, the transfer to the French of the rights held by the American Archaeological Institute unless the Greek Government is assured that the necessary \$40,000 will be raised.

The Missing Cardinal. Rome, Oct. 24.—The Cardinal Almondo, the archbishop of Turin, who is in a moribund condition, has long been regarded as the probable successor of Pope Leo XIII. to the chair of St. Peter. He is one of the most learned of the Italian members of the sacred college, and enjoys in a high degree the confidence and affection of his pontiff.

Bad State of Affairs in Russia. St. Petersburg, Oct. 24.—The Telegraph's St. Petersburg correspondent says: The Minister of the Interior has received alarming reports of the state of the country. The prisons are crowded with suspects, chiefly young men of the educated classes. Disaffection is spreading everywhere, incendiarism is rife and there have been conflicts in many places between the peasantry and soldiers.

The City of Chicago Delayed. London, Oct. 24.—The Inman Line steamer City of Chicago, Capt. Bedford, from Liverpool, sailed from Queenstown for New York at 12:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon. She subsequently returned, it having been found that her propeller was not working properly. Two divers made an examination of the steamer and it was discovered that a wire hawser 20 fathoms in length had become entangled in the propeller. The divers removed the obstruction and the steamer again proceeded for New York.

Terrible Treatment of Female Tourists. London, Oct. 24.—News is received of a horrible outrage committed by three Italian soldiers upon two young women tourists visiting the famous monastery at St. Bernard, in the Alpine pass of that name. These women, whose home is in Wales, were seized by the soldiers, carried to a secluded spot, assaulted and left to find their way out as best they could. Their cries attracted attention and the girls were taken to the hospital. They have since suffered terribly from their brutal treatment. The girls are not able to identify their assailants and the ruffians have completely escaped detection.

Count Von Moltke's Birthday Fete. Berlin, Oct. 24.—A commensal in honor of Count Von Moltke was given by the Students' Association this evening, and was attended by 2,000 persons, including many non prominent in military, literary and artistic circles. Pastor Rogge delivered an oration, in which he extolled the veteran. Prof. Treusschke spoke on the army. A letter from Count Von Moltke was read, thanking the students, who telegraphed their congratulations in reply.

Emperor William has sent to Count Von Moltke, as a birthday present, a marshal's silver baton embellished with imperial eagles and set with diamonds.

The Reichsanzeiger publishes a list of the officers who will surround Emperor William when he offers his congratulations to Count Moltke on the occasion of his birthday. The name of Prince Bismarck is omitted from the list. The number of those who have announced their intention of taking part in the grand torchlight procession is 20,000.

Serious Charges Against Stanley. London, Oct. 24.—"The Diaries and Letters of Major Barttelot," the murdered commander of Stanley's rear guard, are published here to-day. They contain serious charges against the African explorer. The book was edited by the dead man's brother, Walter Barttelot, who is the press face says: "It is not likely that this book would have been written or one word of its contents ever been published had justice even been partially done, or any kind shown by the leader of the expedition to the officer who was left at Yambuya with his impediments, stores and baggage."

Charges of malignity, ingratitude, misrepresentation and desertion are then brought against Stanley, besides some other less important accusations. The

The Mission Orphanage and Schools in British Columbia.

Questions and Answers—Report of the Memorial and Publication Committee.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON. This afternoon's session of the Women's Methodist Missionary Society opened with singing and prayer and the usual reading of the minutes.

A telegraphic report was received from the Women's Baptist Mission Society now in annual convention at Brantford, worded with I. Thess., iii, 16.

Mrs. (Dr.) Parker, of the Outlook, read her annual report, dealing with the Christian influence and work of the paper, and the spirit of unity, which it tended to promote by reaching the members far and near.

The bright little Messenger was also circulated to the extent of 6,000 copies. The report of the Supply Committee, read by Mrs. (Dr.) Briggs, of Toronto, set forth the amount of goods and requisite supplies sent to the different missions, including the Chilliwack, Saugum, Mission, to the Indians and other places. Good work was done in this department.

As appointed yesterday, letters were read from A. E. Green, of Wellington, B. C., from Rev. C. Bryant, president of the Columbia Conference, and others, regarding the site for the new Crosby school for girls. They were almost unanimously recommending Fort Simpson as the most desirable locality, in preference to Bella Bella.

On motion of Mrs. (Dr.) Carman, of Belleville, the Board decided that the school be retained at Fort Simpson, where the Boys' Home now stands. The corresponding Secretary moved that the meeting request Rev. T. Crosby to purchase a suitable site on reasonable terms as possible for the new home for girls to be approved by the ladies of the home, and that the land be deeded in the name of the Women's Missionary Society. On motion the action on this resolution was deferred for further consideration.

The answering of the question drawer communication fell to the lot of the Vice-President, as the mouthpiece for the three members who had been appointed to prepare replies.

One question was: Has a branch meeting a right to take on a memorial sent from an auxiliary to the Board. The reply was in the negative.

Another communication read as follows: "Is it not right that there should be some way arranged by which separate auxiliaries might be represented in the general Board meeting?" The Vice-President agreed with the spirit of the question. They would recommend that when auxiliaries were formed outside the limits of the branches that they designate the branch with which they wished to be connected, and they may elect at their annual meeting a delegate from among the members of said branch to represent them at the branch annual meeting, and this delegate would be eligible for election to the Board.

THE SEALING BUSINESS. Sir George Baden Powell Has Been Investigating the Matter.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—Sir George Baden Powell was in town yesterday. While in British Columbia he made inquiries into certain matters connected with the sealing business, and goes back with information that has not previously been accepted by the British Government. In the negotiations which have already taken place he said that the United States made three or four contentions which it was thought best to inquire into. One was that Behring Sea belonged to the United States as an international boundary, and that the British and American sealers were killing all the fur seals on the coast side. Cornell in Luck. ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 24.—At the meeting of the Cornell University trustees yesterday Henry W. Sage added \$200,000 to his previous gift of \$600,000 for the establishment of a department of philosophy. Mr. Sage's gifts to the university now aggregate more than \$1,000,000. The president's report showed 1,314 students in actual attendance. The treasurer's report showed an endowment of \$500,000. Among the trustees recently elected is Andrew Carnegie, who took his seat.

Sandwich Assizes. SANDWICH, Ont., Oct. 24.—The case of Brown vs. Sandwith East was not concluded at the Assizes yesterday until after 4 o'clock, and Judge MacMahon took the case into his hands. He also indicated that he would do justice in the case of Labate vs. Sandwith East. McNeil vs. Purser and Ellis vs. Bockstall have been adjourned until the Chancery Sittings, and the case of McNeil vs. Ellis has been traversed.

There is not any likelihood of the non-jury cases being tried this term, as the court is Saturday night so that Judge MacMahon can be present at the next Assizes, which open on Monday. The grand jury brought in another true bill against Daniel Mayhew for timber stealing, and true bills against Arthur Ferris and William Ford for bag and snare offense. This makes eight indictments in the timber-stealing cases.

Police McKee, who had the cases in hand, at Rollin's Fork, Mass., on Wednesday, is being highly congratulated in the circle of evidence around the prisoners. The grand jury brought in a true bill against Wm. Mitchell for assaulting George Fox, of Leamington, and their labors are now ended.

FRIDAY MORNING. The session opened with a full attendance of delegates. After singing and prayer led by Mrs. (Rev.) Blackstock, of Toronto, and the reading of the minutes, Mrs. Carman's resolution regarding the re-arrangement of the western and central branches to correspond with the annual conference limits was reconsidered, and on the vote the amendment to leave the matter to the branches was carried.

Unfinished reports were taken up. The Memorial Committee reported the following which they did not entertain: "That all moneys sent by auxiliaries to special objects under the control of the society, such as to the Supply Committee, literature fund, French Institute, furnishings, etc., be credited as income and acknowledged recommending Fort Simpson as the most desirable locality, in preference to Bella Bella."

Miss Palmer's amendment on this question was carried as follows: That the general Board make appropriation for all their work and no special appeals be made to our auxiliaries, but all our funds pass through branch and board treasurers.

Mrs. (Dr.) Briggs' report of the Appropriation Committee placed the estimates for the Tokio school, Japan, at \$4,500; for Shizuoka, \$1,500; for Kofu, \$2,400. In connection with the latter a recommendation was made, that owing to the uncomfortable situation of the school an appropriation of a sufficient sum, say \$1,500, be made to assist the Japanese in erecting a new building for the school inside the city, also that the committee instruct the Japanese Board to make the building in the name of the Women's Methodist Missionary Society. The action was already \$1,500 in the bank for the purpose, and the new work would require \$2,875. The total appropriation for Japan was \$14,170, not including the amount required for the Kofu new structure.

The total appropriation for French work was placed at \$4,500, of which \$5,000 goes to the French Institute.

The amount appropriated for the Chinese Home, in Victoria, B. C., was \$1,250.

The letter from Rev. Dr. Potts, which was brought up at the General Board of Missions was read, setting forth the desirability of a mission in Palestine and Syria, for the employment of medical missionaries and the establishment of one or more girls' schools.

On motion of Mrs. McKay, the matter was laid over for another year, the Board thinking they had enough on hand for the present.

In order to allow committee to meet and finish their reports, the session adjourned at 11:20 a.m., to convene again at 1:30 p.m., and then conclude the business of the year.

Bo Was "Fooling" with a Rifle. ALPENA, Mich., Oct. 24.—Last evening as Mattie Moulton, a young miss of 14 years, was visiting at the residence of Mr. Beebe, Harry Beebe began fooling with a rifle that he supposed was not loaded, when the weapon was discharged. The ball penetrated the girl's head and death was instantaneous.

Bogus Spices. OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—The investigations of the analyst in the inland Revenue Department show that scarcely any spices in the ground state in which they are generally sold are found to be pure. The pepper is largely mixed with starch and other substances. The mustard contains flour and even plaster of Paris, while the ground cinnamon contains scarcely anything of the genuine article beside the flavor.

The Story of a Blank Check. DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 24.—Mrs. N. S. Scrump, wife of the secretary of the Dubuque Fire and Marine Insurance Company, who is visiting friends in Rose Hill, near Chicago, wrote home for funds. Her husband signed a blank check on a bank in this city and humorously wrote her not to draw for more than \$10,000. While riding in a Chicago street car her pocket was picked and the letter and check. On Wednesday the Dubuque bank received an order to stop payment on a check for \$3,000 signed Mary Clementine, as it had been stolen. It is believed that Mary Clementine is Mary Klemens, formerly of this city, who poisoned her sister in Rosehill and confessed to having poisoned and killed her father, mother and brother in this city. She was adjudged insane by the Chicago authorities and was put in a hospital, from which she was afterwards released. She is supposed to have taken the blank check and, after filling it up for \$3,000, had it stolen from her.

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
