NEWFOUNDLAND'S TROUBLES

Discussed in the Speech from the
Throne.

St. Johns, Nfld., Dec. 16.—A special
session of the Legislature opened yester-
day afternoon. Gov. O'Brien delivered the
speech from the throne and devoted his
address almost solely to the financial
troubles. He announced the intention of
the Government to appoint a select com-
mittee to consider the whole question, to
investigate the banks, as allowed by their
charters, and adopt some means of estab-
lishing a circulating currency. He said
the Government had arranged for provid-
ing means for paying interest on the
colony's debt, due at the beginning
of the new year, that being their first
day of assuming office.

The governor does not think the situation
more than a temporary inconvenience, and
is of the opinion that it is not likely to
permanently injure the colony, but he
ensured the methods of trading shown by
the recent failures. Several English banks
intend sending out adjusters to see what
terms they can possibly give to firms in a
position to continue business.

The Union Bank is now almost certain
to survive the panic. Aid is promised the
bank and its notes are freely accepted. The
bankers announce the assignment of two
private houses yesterday, but the assignments
have not been registered yet. Statements
of the condition of both the closed banks
will be printed Monday.

IN DEEP DISTRESS.
Thousands of unemployed men fill the
streets. This army is recruited by schooner
loads from the outposts, coming to ex-
change banknotes for food at half their
face value. The northern mail steamer
Virginia Lake arrived this morning bring-
ing about 150 passengers. Their narratives
show that the whole country is in deep
distress. People are ruined who were
weak in comfortable circumstances. The
entire coast, with settlements containing
about 150,000 souls, is absolutely
deserted, except for the provisions sent
from St. John during the fall, and ice will
soon make communication impossible. The
miseries of 40 years ago, when Indian
meal was a staple diet, promises to be sur-
passed. Bank directors and others who
knew a crisis was impending, are accused
of collecting the accounts the day before
the crash and drawing gold, and it is
alleged that they have
