RIDGE TOWN MAN TOPS THE SCORE.
Interstate Park, Queens, L. I., April 4.—
Shooting in the Grand American handi-
cap at five birds began here this
morning in a drizzling rain. There was
very little wind to bother the shooters,
who had the advantage of the birds, in-
asmuch as the rain tended to make them
a bit slow. In addition to the 20 regular
entries, there were 12 post entries made
up to the time the shoot began. The
list now contains 22 names, and there
will possibly be half a dozen more post
entries. Allowing a reasonable number
of forfeits, the field of contestants will
be about the same as last year, when 21
shooters took part in the handicap. The
conditions of the Grand American handi-
cap are: Twenty-five birds, \$5 entrance,
birds extra, high guns, not class shoot-
ing, \$1.00 guaranteed, \$50 to first and
silver cup, \$500 to second and \$400 to
third; all extra moneys to be divided on
a percentage basis to the next 51 highest
scores.

At the end of the first round of the four
sets of trials, 132 men had straight scores
of four kills each. Twenty-one men paid
forfeits, and there were exactly 201 con-
testants. The time of the first round was
1 hour and 2 minutes. Among the most
prominent in the list of those who
scored eight kills when they had finish-
ed their second round were: Bates, Cros-
by, Naumap, Phil Daly, J. M. Fox, Ted
Sloan, Dr. Knowlton, Bunks, Gilbert and
Marshall.
