MOSTLY FAIR.

TORONTO, June 20—11 p.m.—There is a slight increase in pressure over the North-west, where the weather is now generally fair. A decrease in pressure is taking place over the lakes and eastern districts. The weather is generally fine from the lakes to the Atlantic and very warm in Ontario and Western Quebec. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Edmonton, 44°—62°; Battleford, 44°—66°; Esquimaux, 48°—78°; Qu'Appelle, 48°—68°; Toronto, 65°—77°; Kingston, 64°—76°; Quebec, 65°—86°; Halifax, 46°—74°.

TERSELY TOLD.

The Bank of New Hanover, N. C., made an assignment Monday. The liabilities are estimated at \$1,250,000, and the assets at \$800,000.

Thomas F. Bayard, American ambassador to Great Britain, will proceed to Windsor Castle on Friday next to present his credentials to the Queen.

Col. E. C. Ainsworth, Wm. Covert, superintendent of Ford's Theatre building, Washington, and Francis Sasse, its engineer, appeared voluntarily in the criminal court Tuesday and gave bail for their appearance in the sum of \$10,000. They are charged with criminal negligence, resulting in the recent terrible disaster.

Marshall Jose Simaco de Oliveira, of Brazil, president of the Brazilian commission to the World's Columbian Exposition, died at New York Tuesday.

DISASTROUS RAILWAY ACCIDENT

Resulting in Nine Deaths—A Hundred Persons Injured.

NEW YORK, June 20.—A train on the Long Island Railway, upon which were about 1,000 persons returning from the Sheephead Bay races, was derailed this evening in a tunnel a short distance from Parkville, L. I.

Two persons were killed outright, two died soon after being removed to the hospital, and about 100 were injured, many so seriously that they will not recover.

Dead—Those killed were Patrick Daly, a court officer, New York City; H. S. Pringle, New York City.

The following died soon after wards: Henry Spink, marshal at Jefferson Market Police Court, New York City; Robert J. Cudley, a policeman, New York City.

Those thought to be fatally injured are: Andrew Bartholomew, of Seeley Creek, Chemung county, New York, and five men named Flynn, Ford, Quibby, Addicks and Bradford.

ADDITIONAL DEATHS.

B. J. McGonigle, Fritz D. Johnson and John Simlay have died in the hospital.

An unknown man was found under the fourth car of the train dead. A card in his pocket bore the name "W. B. Hutchinson." There is still unidentified man at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. This makes the tenth victim.

A FREE WOMAN!

Lizzie Borden Acquitted of the Charges Against Her.

A Scene of Wild Excitement When the Verdict Was Announced.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 20.—At the opening of the court here this morning there were as many people as at any time during the trial. The jury was polled, and District Attorney Knowlton closed his argument.

At 1:45 the court resumed its session, and the defendant was given an opportunity to speak. She said:

"I am innocent, but I will leave my case in your hands and with my counsel."

Justice Dewey then charged the jury. He told them to disregard previous hearings, and defend the different degrees of murder. He stated the presumption of innocence was increased by defendant's character, and said there must be a real and operative motive.

The jury retired, and then filed into their seats at 4:30. Miss Borden was asked to stand up and the foreman was asked to return the verdict, upon which he announced "Not guilty."

After the verdict had been received the district attorney moved that the case against Miss Borden be nolle prossed, and the order of the court was made to that effect.

When the verdict of "Not guilty" was returned a cheer went up which might have been heard half a mile away through the open windows, and there was no attempt to check it.

Late Canadian News

G. T. R. earnings for week ending June 17, 1899, \$385,134, increase over same week in 1892 of \$21,438.

The accounts of W. J. Jackson, treasurer of East Passage, are reported to have been found short by about \$9,000.

About 1,000 excursionists from the vicinity of Port Hope visited Guelph and the Agricultural College on Tuesday.

Thomas S. Elliott, one of the oldest residents of Belleville, died on Monday, aged 81 years. He had lived there 60 years.

C. W. Reid, lumber dealer of Fergus, for trying to buy \$7,000 worth of counterfeit money was remanded for trial at Guelph; bail \$1,500.

Stephen Bradshaw, a Hamilton teamster, employed hauling stone, was probably fatally injured on Tuesday in trying to hold in his frightened horses.

At Toronto on Tuesday, C. J. Bright, blacksmith, had his leg broken; Miss Murdoch was probably fatally hurt, and Thomas Randall was injured—all by horses taking fright at the street cars.

Schlehauf Bros.' saw factory at West Lorne was destroyed by fire yesterday. Loss, \$5,000. Twenty-eight men were thrown out of employment.

OH FOR CHICAGO!

A Rate of One Fare for the Round Trip Likely To Be Adopted.
