



In all classes today prices had a stiffening tendency. An ex-ceptionally fine lot of well-fed and finish-ed export cattle were brought in by Mr. Grough from the Elmira and Waterloo district, where the German farmers evi-dently know the art of feeding cattle thoroughly. Joseph Gould bought these, the price, it is understood, being \$5 25, though the deal was kept very close; that is a top price, and cattle must be very good to reach it. Mr. Dunn paid \$5, and Mr. Dean paid \$5 12½ for export cattle today. 


