Britain Has Been Issued.

London, Nov. 19.-The Anglo-Portuguese treaty of arbitration, the signing of which was announced by King Edward at the state banquet at Wind- sub-lieutenant, according to a telegram pointing out in plain terms the necessor Castle on Nov. 16, was issued tonight. It contains only three articles. The first article provides that differences of a legal nature or relating to the interpretation of existing treaties which cannot be settled diplomatically shall be referred to the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague, provided it "does not affect the vital interests, independence or honor of the two contracting states and does not concern the interests of third parties of procedure prior to appealing to the court and the third article provides that the agreement shall be concluded for a term of five years.
