LEFT \$250,000 FOR A HOSPITAL

Ministers and Socialists Barred From Connection With Its Management.

London, April 18.—Mr. John Ker-shaw, P. C. S., of St. Anne's-of-the-Sea, Lancashire, who died on Feb. 14, leaving property worth £79,195, stated in his will:

"I desire that my body be cremated, that my funeral be as simple and inexpensive as possible, that there be no religious ceremony at or in connection with my death or burial, and that no outward sign of mourning be displayed at my house or by any of my relatives or friends."

He stated that he made no provision for his two sons and his daughters, as they are amply provided for, nor for his wife. He left an annuity during his lifetime of £200 to his house-keeper, Agnes Williams, if still in his service, and an annuity of £100 during his lifetime to his friend, Annie Clowes.

The residuary estate, over £50,000, he left to establish and endow a hospital in Royton, Lancashire, stating his desire that it should be free to all applicants, that no inquiry should be made as to the religious belief of applicants, and that no clergyman, or minister of religion or Socialist should be at any time a trustee, director or manager of the hospital.

FIFTEEN THOUSAND IMMIGRANTS

Montreal, April 17.—From March 15 to April 15, 16,000 immigrants, exclusive of children under age, have passed through the Canadian Pacific Windsor station. Of the number, 12,045, or 75 per cent, went directly to Winnipeg, and from there scattered themselves over the far west. 2,955 used Toronto as their distributing centre, most of these going to various parts of New Ontario, and 1,500 scattered themselves along the line from Montreal to Saint Ste. Marie.

MR. FIELDING TO HAVE BALANCE TO THE GOOD

Finance Minister Will Announce Small Surplus at Presentation of Budget.

Ottawa, April 18.—It is expected that Hon. Mr. Fielding will be able to announce in his budget speech on Tuesday next that the revenue for the fiscal year ending with the last month has been sufficient to meet all the demands of the ordinary expenditure for the year, with a small balance to the good. Full returns of revenue and expenditure are not yet available, and the final accounts for the year will not be closed for some weeks yet, but indications now point to a small surplus, despite the falling off in revenue to the extent of eleven and a half millions consequent upon the decrease in imports during the period of temporary trade depression.

For the coming year he will be able to point to a steadily-increasing revenue, and a probable substantial surplus at the end of the year.

Owing to the expenditure on the National Transcontinental Railway and other items of capital account, the total revenue will, of course, fall far short of the total expenditure, but for the greater part of this increase in public debt the Government can point to what will be a permanent three or four years a revenue-producing asset.

It is not expected that the debate on the budget will be a long one. Both leaders have agreed to put through the rest of the session a budget with as little delay as possible, and prorogation will be practically fixed for the third week in May.

Mr. Fielding is, of course, keeping his own counsel as to the announcement of his budget speech, but it is not anticipated that the tariff changes, if any, will be of great importance.

SKULL FRACTURED IN WINDOR ROW

Albert Clark, Aged 35, of Ridgeway, Ont., Dies as Result of a Blow.

Windsor, Ont., April 18.—John Marcon, one of the best-known young men of this city, was arrested and locked up in Detroit, charged with having caused the death of Albert Clark, aged 35, of Ridgeway.

The men became engaged in an altercation in Elliott's saloon, on Congress street, and Marcon struck Clark a heavy blow in the face, which knocked him senseless to the sidewalk. When picked up and taken to St. Mary's Hospital his skull was found to be fractured, and he died a few hours afterwards.

Stories differ as to how the fight started. One is that Clark refused to pay for a drink, and the other that Marcon, who is 32 years of age, has been prominently identified with sporting events, both in this city and in Michigan. He was employed as agent in Detroit for a Milwaukee brewery.

Clark was employed as a watchman on one of the boats, and roomed with his wife at 200 Congress street. His home was in Ridgeway, where his body will be sent for burial.

DRY AND WET CITIES START ODD WAR

Commercial Strife Breaks Out Between Logansport and Peru, Indiana.

Indianapolis, April 18.—A bitter commercial war has broken out between the "wet" city of Logansport and the "dry" city of Peru, Ind. The former is patronizing Peru merchants and wet sympathizers in the latter are going to Logansport to spend their money.

The Logansport Business Men's Association, which espoused the cause of the wet in the recent local option election, has petitioned the Pennsylvania Railroad to run week-end excursions to that city, and has purchased 10,000 interurban tickets to be used in attracting buyers from territory.

The other day a delegation of Logansport ladies visited Peru and waited upon the merchants, asking them to advertise in the Logansport papers. By various means of the delegation purchased a spring outfit, and arrangements were made by some of them to buy groceries in the way of groceries sent to them by interurban cars.

There will be twelve local option elections in the near future, and the wet and dry cities are flooding the territory with statements as to the effect of local option on business.

There were but few passengers on the ferry, and while there was a panic on the boat, no person was injured. The tug International finally got a line to the Niagara and towed her to the Canadian side of the river just below the bridge, where she is now tied up. The passengers were landed.

ARCHBISHOPS' CONFERENCE.

Ottawa, April 19.—The six archbishops of Canada, who will attend the conference of archbishops here tomorrow, are expected to arrive this evening. Among the speakers will be the company Archbishop Bégyn, of Quebec. The conference is to be held at the archbishop's palace.

HEARING ENLARGED.

Toronto, April 19.—Mr. Justice Riddell, this morning again enlarged the hearing of the application for release of Graf, alias Munro, of Buffalo, now serving 23 months in the Central Prison for the sale of indecent pictures and postcards. This time the enlargement was until Friday, in order to allow of a technicality in regard to some of the papers in the case being attended to. LONGBOAT OVERHAULED

Not the Indian, But the Big G. T. R. Mogul on London-Windsor Train.

Engine No. 1,334, known to the railroad men as "Longboat," will be placed on the run between this city and Windsor again next week, after having been thoroughly overhauled.

"That type of engine is proving one of the most successful we have yet had," an official told The Advertiser this afternoon. "They stand longer runs and go faster than almost any other engine we have. 1,334 was not sent to the shops until it had completed 80,000 miles, and the two engines of the same type which are on the Toronto division are doing equally well. There is only one engine on this division that ever surpassed that record, and that is No. 439, which ran 100,000 miles without being sent to the shops. The big consolidated engine of the 600 type will seldom run more than 40,000 miles without repairs."

DIAMOND MAKER CAUGHT

Henri Lemoine, Who Has a Ten Years' Sentence to Serve, Found in Paris.

Paris, April 18.—Henri Lemoine, the "diamond maker," was arrested here today. He is the man who created a sensation last summer by pretending that he could make diamonds.

After he had received a good many persons he was arrested in Paris on complaint of Julius Werneher, the English diamond magnate, who had advanced him a large sum of money, believing in the genuineness of his process.

Lemoine brazened it out so well that finally the magistrate who had his case in charge released him in order to give him a chance to show that he really could make the gems. By various pretences he postponed the test until the magistrate's patience was exhausted, and then he disappeared.

That was on June 17. The indulgent magistrate lost his place and Lemoine was tried in default and sentenced to ten years in prison. Since then reports have been received that he was in Italy, in Turkey and other places, but he managed to evade justice until today.

Lemoine reached Paris last Friday, his only disguise being the removal of his noticeable beard. The police learned of his arrival on Tuesday, and two detectives were assigned to find him. They learned that he intended to visit his ex-secretary today, and they met him and took him into custody.

He told the detectives that he had been visiting Montmartre night cafes ever since his arrival. When he left Paris last June he went to Soia, Budapest, Vienna and Trieste, and thence to London in November. He expressed the utmost confidence that his condemnation to ten years in prison would be quashed.

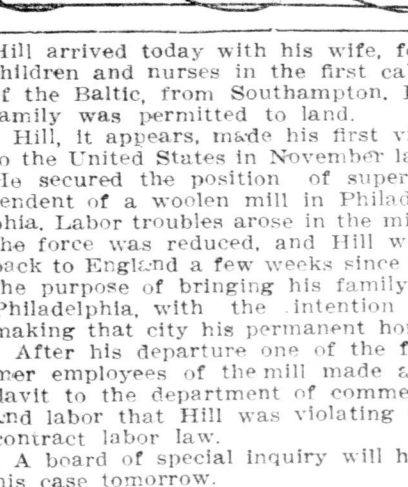
