Giant Lottery Concern Unearthed By Uncle Sam

Many Arrests Made and Express
Companies May Be
Involved.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—A morning paper
today says: The biggest lottery in
operation in the United States, which
has been running for more than twenty
years, with headquarters in Chi-
cago, is claimed to have been exposed
last night by arrests in this and other
cities. The United States secret ser-
vice men assert that the promoters of
the scheme have made millions of
dollars and that there are big men
behind it who will be reached through
the prosecution of the men now under
arrest.

The name of the Old Reliable
Guaranty Trust Company, it is
alleged the lottery maintained three
luxuriously furnished offices and a
large printing establishment here.
Secret service agents, Harry T.
Donaghy, Otto F. Klink and Law-
rence Rice, raided all four of the
establishments last night. They ob-
tained thousands of tickets, lottery para-

TRY TO IMPEACH AMERICAN'S STORY

Duke of Portland Is Fighting
Hard to Save His
Dukedom.

London, Nov. 13.—Attorneys, acting
for the sixth Duke of Portland, are
gathering every bit of evidence they
can in and around New York, regard-
ing the affairs of Robert Caldwell,
who told a sensational story in the
London courts last week, regarding
the alleged dual life of the fifth Duke
of Portland during the trial of the
case brought by the heirs of T. C.
Druce, who, it is claimed, was the
real fifth Duke of Portland.

Caldwell's life history has been
cabled to the lawyers representing the
duke, and it is stated, when Caldwell
takes the stand Friday for cross-
examination, he will be confronted
with a mass of facts that will be used
as the basis of an effort to shake his
testimony that he arranged to bury
T. C. Druce when the latter decided
to abandon his double life and live as
the duke only.

One of the affidavits obtained was
made by Nathaniel Inch, who declared
that he and two other men now living
in New York, worked with the wit-
ness in London at the time the
supposed duke was buried, and that
Caldwell was at no time away from
the grain mills where they were em-
ployed. Mr. Inch is positive in his
assertion that Caldwell never knew
either Druce or the Duke of Portland,
and that he had nothing to do with
the alleged mock funeral.

Mr. Inch says he has known Cald-
well for nearly 50 years, and that he
was associated with him for nearly 40
years. He says they worked together
