#### HEROIC SERVICES OF MOUNTED POLICE

The World's "Finest Force"-Annual Report Presented to Parliament. Ottawa, Jan. 14.-The annual report of the Northwest Mounted Police tabled in the Commons, contains the usual record of faithful and, in many cases, heroic service quietly and efficiently performed by "the finest police force in the world."

The strength of the force now stands at 51 officers and 600 non-commissioned officers and constables, or practically the same as in the previous years. They are stationed at ten divisional posts of 148 detachments. The farthest flung detachment is on the Arctic Ocean, 2,500 miles from headquarters, and it takes two months to make the journey, Commissioner Perry states that the Governments of Alberta and Saskatchewan have asked that the present
