Force From Warships Will Prevent Fighting at Nicaraguan Capital.

Washington, May 20. - A force of 100 sailors has been landed at Blue-fields by Commander W. W. Gilmer, commanding officer of the United States gunboat Paduca, to protect the lives and property of Americans and other foreigners. Commander Gilmer has advised the navy department that Estrada and Madriz forces are within three miles of each other and that a

battle is expected momentarily. The steamer Venus, which has been at Bluefields for several days, has been ordered away from the port by Commander Gilmer and will not be al-

owed to return. Senor Irias, her commander, served notice that he intended to bombard the town if the insurgents did not sur-

Commander Gilmer declined to permit the bombardment.




