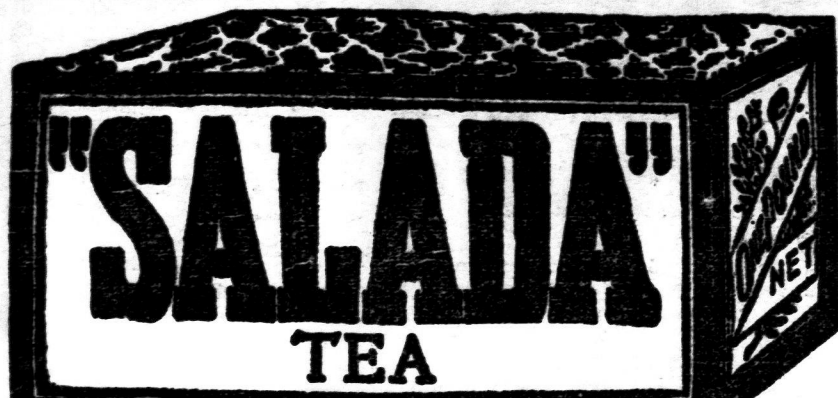

LOOKS LIKE EARLY STRAITS OPENING

Ice Is Only Half the Thickness of Year Ago—More Warm Weather Needed.

Detroit, March 16.—According to the weekly ice report issued by the weather bureau, under the supervision of Inspector Conger, there is less ice in all the lakes than at this time last year. At the Straits of Mackinac the ice now is 10 inches in thickness, and last season it was 20 inches. Reports from regular and display stations indicate that the ice fields over western Superior have moved out into the lake and are visible from Keweenaw Point, and extend beyond vision. Open water is reported over the eastern portion. Whitefish Bay is intact.

The ice in St. Mary's River is about 15 inches in thickness and has not changed during the week. The ice in Green Bay has softened during the week, under influence of warm weather, and this is considered a slush and water over it. The ice at the "Door" has moved out. In Michigan there is a narrow field of ice extending along shore from St. Joseph northward to the islands and from Beaver Island north and westward.

At the Straits the ice is 10 inches in thickness and has not changed during the week. In Huron the fields are only reported on the east shore. St. Clair River is open and the ice in Lake St. Clair was broken by the high winds of the 13th and moved over towards the east shore, although the fields cover the mouth of the lake.

In Erie the ice fields continue around the islands, and from the central portion east to Buffalo the fields are extensive and move with the wind. In Ontario the fields are confined to the extreme eastern portion. The cold weather of the 14th and 15th has made the ice firm at the Straits.

GLEESON BROS. BUY THE JOLLY PROPERTY

Local Wagon Works To Be Enlarged on Fullerton Street.

The Jolly property on Fullerton street was sold yesterday afternoon by Mr. J. W. Jones, the auctioneer, to Gleeson Bros., carriage and wagon manufacturers, for \$3,000.

It is understood that Gleeson Bros. will extend their wagon works, which is now one of the growing industries of London.

OWEN SOUND OPTION STANDS

Toronto, March 15.—The divisional court has given judgment on the Owen Sound local option situation, and as a result, Mr. Justice Giesbrecht has dismissed the action brought by one Ward against the municipality to compel it to submit another repealing bylaw.

One repealing bylaw was submitted and defeated. Ward sued on certain allegations, and the divisional court says: "I am of the opinion that the plaintiff could not maintain this action on the facts. It is not shown that the ratepayers, or any of them, desire to have another bylaw submitted, or intend to submit, or refuse to submit, another bylaw."

Ward's counsel argued that a change in the territorial limits in some way affected the voting on the bylaw, but the divisional court does not think so.

POOR GAS PRESSURE

Hamilton, Ont., March 15.—Controllers Allan and Cooper and the city engineer will go to Dunnville on Thursday to inspect the gas wells. Several complaints have been made recently about the poor pressure of natural gas in this city, and the object of the visit of the civic deputation is to see if the city has any chance of going into the gas business on its own account.

LINER HALTED IN A MIDSEA STORM

La Gascogne Has Breakdown—Waves Break Over the Decks—Nearly All Seasick.

New York, March 16.—The French line steamship La Gascogne, in yesterday from Havre, was forced to stop four hours in mid-ocean in stormy weather while the engineering force repaired a broken second steam trap. La Gascogne was tossed about in the trough of the sea in a way that terrified her passengers.

Three days out from Havre when the breakdown occurred, Capt. Dumont, as soon as he learned the cause of the trouble and the fact that it would take a few hours to make repairs, ordered that stewards be sent about the ship to reassure any of the passengers who might think the trouble was more serious than it really was.

The liner carries no first-class passengers, but she had 189 second-class passengers, and 856 in the steerage. The prompt action of the captain prevented a panic. Few of the passengers, however, escaped seasickness as the steamship tossed about. Waves went over every deck of the liner.
