

Record of Transactions for February in Excess of That of a Year Ago.

According to the figures of the assessment department relating to the real estate transactions in the city during the past month, the assessed value of the property was only 66 per cent of the consideration paid. This percentage is lower than it has been for a number of years and is accounted for by the number of new buildings being erected throughout the city. Houses erected on a piece of property after the assessment work for the year has been done, naturally increase the value of the property greatly, while it remains at the same valuation on the assessment books until the next assessment is taken. The result s that the percentage of the assessed value to the consideration paid by purchaser is considerably lowered.

There were 111 real estate transac tions in the city during the month of February, and the sum of \$181,000 was involved. The assessed value of the property was \$119,860. These figures compare favorably with past years, and are considerably in excess of the figures for 1913, when property assessed at \$106,380 changed hands, the consideration being \$153,184.
