WEEKLY STATEMENT OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND

London, March 19.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes:

Total reserve decreased £669,000; circulation increased £157,000; bullion decreased £27,000; other deposits increased £255,000; public deposits decreased £2,500,000; notes received decreased £306,000; Government securities unchanged. The proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 45.92 per cent; last week it was 46.01 per cent.

Rate of discount, 3 per cent.

Berlin, March 19.—The Bourse opened dull and lower today on unfavorable New York advices. The market was supported later and prices advanced and closed firm. Exchange on London 20 marks 48 1/2 pence for checks; money, 2 1/2 per cent; private discount rate, 3 1/2 per cent.

London, March 19.—Money was dearer and discount rates were easy today.

Another fall in Consols and home securities, due to fears of Uster and labor troubles, and further liquidation in Brazilian and Argentine securities, depressed the stock market until late afternoon, when better continental advices and local covering checked the decline and caused a general hardening in values. Consols fell fractionally higher, and Mexican issues were firm.

American securities opened quiet and a fraction lower, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 per cent. Values during the first hour, and later the market improved on New York bidding and closed steady.

The dividend rate of the Bank of England was raised to 5 per cent at the directors' meeting today.

TRADES COUNCIL WILL LEND AID TO STRIKERS

Decide To Appeal to Minister of Justice in Behalf of B. C. Miners.

London Trades and Labor Council last night decided to take an active part in the Dominion-wide protest of the Labor men of Canada against the treatment accorded the striking miners of Vancouver Island by the judiciary of British Columbia. Accordingly, local Labor men will circulate throughout the city a protest to be forwarded to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa. All the union workers of London will be asked to sign the protest, and in addition other citizens who may sympathize with the imprisoned miners for whose release the Labor men are petitioning.

London Trades and Labor Council is a "live wire" organization, according to William Stokes, vice-president of the St. Thomas Labor Educational Association. He was gratified by the large attendance, he said, and expressed the view that elsewhere the London council was regarded as a wide-awake and aggressive organization. He reported that in his own city, St. Thomas, a number of new unions had been recently organized and that others are in process of organization which are expected to meet with marked success.

Last night the London council discussed the proposal to send local delegates to the next Labor Day celebration at St. Thomas. The matter will be decided at the next meeting of the council.

REAL ESTATE BUSINESS IN A HEALTHY STATE

Record of Transactions for February in Excess of That of a Year Ago.

According to the figures of the assessment department relating to the real estate transactions in the city during the past month, the assessed value of the property was only 66 per cent of the consideration paid. This percentage is lower than it has been for a number of years and is accounted for by the number of new buildings being erected throughout the city. Houses erected on a piece of property after the assessment work for the year has been done, naturally increase the value of the property greatly, while it remains at the same valuation on the assessment books until the next assessment is taken. The result is that the percentage of the assessed value to the consideration paid by a purchaser is considerably lowered.

There were 111 real estate transactions in the city during the month of February, and the sum of \$181,000 was involved. The assessed value of the property was \$119,860. These figures compare favorably with past years, and are considerably in excess of the figures for 1913, when property assessed at \$106,380 changed hands, the consideration being \$152,184.
