

ANGLO-JAP AREA TREATY WILL BE OPPOSED BY PREMIER MEIGHEN

Australian Premier Will Demand Renewal of Treaty—Will Point to Canada's Failure To Aid in Empire Naval Protection—Claims Treaty Is Necessary To Australia's Safety.

LONDON, June 15. (By Grattan O'Leary, Staff Correspondent, Canadian Press Limited.)—The advisability of renewing the Anglo-Japanese alliance, a question in which Canada is vitally interested, will be the first item on the agenda of the conference of prime ministers when it opens its sessions Monday. Premier Hughes of Australia, interpreting the public sentiment of his country, will urge renewal, but Premier Meighen is almost certain to throw the whole weight of his influence towards having the treaty denounced.

The Canadian premier was willing to support a renewal of the alliance, providing it could be shown that such renewal was necessary to British interests, but as it had been clearly stated that no vital Empire interest is involved, and as there is a strong sentiment here, both in Government circles and in the press against the treaty, he has practically determined to fight against renewal to the utmost of his power.

On Three Grounds. The premier of Canada will base his opposition to the treaty on three main grounds: First, that the reasons which made it necessary in 1911 have since disappeared; second, that renewal of the treaty would be regarded as a challenge to the United States; and third, that the formation of special alliances is antagonistic to the spirit of the time and to the general feeling of the world is making towards disarmament and peace.

In this attitude Mr. Meighen is certain to encounter strong opposition. Premier Hughes has been talking and giving interviews to the British press, and with characteristic vigor is demanding that the treaty be renewed. He urges, of course, that it be framed in such a way as to be satisfactory to the United States, but few here think such a thing is possible. The Australian premier's strong card will be the attitude which Premier Meighen is almost certain to adopt on the question of naval defense.

Ask Postponement. The Canadian premier contemplates urging that the conference be postponed until the next constitutional conference, or at least until the international situation becomes more clear. This Mr. Hughes will undoubtedly reply, and with some force that Mr. Meighen seems to have no other protection, first removing whatever safeguard the commonwealth derives from the treaty and then refusing to

help provide greater naval protection on the Pacific. "You refuse to give us the treaty," he will probably argue, "and then you want to delay in providing means of assistance in our defence." It is also likely already said, a contention not without force and will not be weakened by the fact that Mr. Meighen is also likely to interpret the public sentiment of his country, will urge renewal, but Premier Meighen is almost certain to throw the whole weight of his influence towards having the treaty denounced.

The Canadian premier, however, is unlikely to be daunted by these arguments. He will reply—and in this he is likely to have the support of Premier Smuts of South Africa, if not Lloyd George—there is only one nation of which Australia can be afraid, that is Japan, and the best protection against Japan, or any other country, is the knowledge on the part of the world that good relations and an understanding exist between the British Empire and the United States. In a word, the conference is the best hope of the world for world peace is a better understanding among English-speaking peoples. Should he fall in his purpose of having the treaty denounced he will ask that a clause be inserted in the new treaty exempting Canada from its provisions, unless and until accepted by the Parliament of the Dominion. Such a clause, it will be remembered, was inserted in the Anglo-French treaty.

Because of the indisposition of Mr. David Lloyd George the conference does not open until Monday. The agenda has been debated in the House of Commons and official dispatches have been given to the report that the premier will attend the opening of the North Ulster Parliament. 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United States and Japan Open Direct Negotiations Over Various Questions

Matters For Consideration Include the Island of Yap, the Immigration Question, the Alien Land Question and the Return of Shantung To China—Baron Shidehara To Meet Secretary of State Hughes.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Direct negotiations have been begun between the United States and Japan for the settlement of the questions pending between them.

Four Big Questions. These include the island of Yap, the immigration question, the alien land question and the return of Shantung to China by Japan.

The negotiations are being conducted by Baron Shidehara, the Japanese ambassador, and Secretary of State Hughes. The proposal is to settle the immigration issue on the basis of complete stoppage of all Japanese coolie immigration, with proper protection for Japanese property rights already acquired in the United States.

Will Evacuate Shantung. Japan's promise to return Shantung to China, it is said, is to be treated as soon as practicable, and without reference of the question to an international tribunal. The initial stage has been taken for the evacuation of the portion of the province held by Japanese. The military force having been reduced to between 3,000 and 3,500 soldiers.

Advice from Tokyo have said this force would be withdrawn as soon as China provided guards for the railroads and property in the towns. Japan it is stated, will retain only such privileges in the province as are common to the other nations.

CANADIAN WARSHIPS AT LOS ANGELES. SEATTLE, June 15.—Three Canadian warships, the cruiser Aurora and destroyers Patricia and Patricia, anchored in Los Angeles Harbor yesterday, en route from Vancouver to Halifax. The Aurora and the destroyers will be in port several days before proceeding to Panama.

J. HARRY FLYNN IS STRUCK OFF ROLLS OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE EMPIRE.

Action Taken by Executive Board—Herbert Capewell Also Struck Off.

TORONTO, June 15.—J. Harry Flynn, Dominion organizer of the Grand Army of United Veterans, has resigned his position at the request of the executive board. Announcement was made tonight by the board that Flynn was granted 30 days leave of absence on account of ill-health, but was asked to tender his resignation first. Flynn returned to his home in Massachusetts at the request of the board.

Herbert Capewell, who accompanied Flynn on his organizing tour, was also struck off the rolls.

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ATTENTIVE TO TAKE CONSTANTINOPLE WILL MEAN WAR WITH G.T. BRITAIN

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 15.—The British have warned the Turkish Nationalists that any attempt to take Constantinople will mean war with Great Britain. The purpose of sending a British brigade from Malta to relieve the Greeks at Ismid is to frustrate any such Nationalist attempt to occupy Constantinople.

GALT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH SCENE OF ORDINATION SERVICE

WHEAT HEADING OUT BETTER, REPORTS SAY

Optimism Regarding Crop Marks Summary of Agricultural Department.

Following is a summary of reports made by the agricultural representatives of the Ontario department of agriculture:

Full wheat is heading out rather better than was expected, but there are some complaints of loose smut. Kent and Hastings are likely to be short of straw.

Red clover is not doing so well, being rather short in length, with the fields looking patchy in places.

On the other hand, clover, as a rule, is looking fine, and is now being cut for hay.

Simcoe reports that sweet clover is cut, and that silo filling from this crop will be generous.

Peterborough and Lennox and Addington say that owing to the expected failure of the hay crop, there will be a larger area of millet sown than for years.

Headlines reports that summer-fallowing is being more practiced this year than for several seasons.

Potatoes are coming along very satisfactorily, but the beetles are said to be unusually plentiful. The root crops are not so promising, as some rootworm had to be done.

Lincoln reports a heavy drop of fruit from peach trees during the past week.

Norfolk says: "Insects seem to be very bad this year. Grasshoppers are a real menace in some districts. Potatoes are reported as being very good. Peas are making their appearance in very large numbers. Truck crops and small fruits have their annual visitors in larger numbers than usual."

Leeds complains that mustard seems to be more plentiful this year. "Three-ring canker" is reported as showing up considerably in new seedling, as well as in the spring grain crops.

Cattle on pasture are generally in good form, and the flow of milk is generous. As for the sheep, they are showing up considerably in new seedling, as well as in the spring grain crops.

York reports cream as selling on the basis of 25 cents a pound of butterfat. Cheese sold on the boards in Peterborough and Hastings last Friday at 14 1/2 and 14 3/4 per pound, respectively.

Leeds reports that at the present time are pure and healthy. "At the first consignment sale of Holsteins at Navan, under the auspices of the Russell County Holstein Breeders' Club, the mature cows sold for \$250 and the young stock from \$35 to \$65."

Welland states: "At a recent Short-horn sale, 40 head averaged \$180. Young stock sold for considerable more than matured. Good individuals with good pedigree are well demonstrated. There is always good market for well-bred individuals with the right conformation."

Hogs are selling at a comparatively low figure, \$8 to \$8.50 per cwt. on foot being the price quoted. The supply of bacon hogs on hand is much smaller than for years. Welland states that many farmers in that county have gone out of hog raising entirely. Young pigs are hard to procure, and are relatively high in price.

Regarding farm labor, Norfolk reports a number of men looking for work, and remarks that there is difficulty in finding men for the harvest. "The demand for most farmers seem to be well supplied with farm help."

WOULD MAKE THOSE WHO VOTE WAR GO TO THE FRONT FIRST

A. F. of L. Asked To Indorse Resolution Withdrawing the Power To Declare War From Congress—Would Have Question Submitted To Vote of People—Demand Permit To Make Wholesome Beer.

DENVER, Col., June 15.—Organized labor would demand that the power to declare war be withdrawn from Congress and be placed in the hands of the people by constitutional amendment, if a resolution presented today is adopted by the convention of the American Federation of Labor.

Majority To Fight First. The proposal provides that a declaration of war must have the approval of a majority of the voters of the United States, and that "all those voting in favor of the declaration of war be compelled to take up the active prosecution of the same before those who voted against the declaration of war."

Should the resolution be adopted, the legislative committee of the federation would be instructed to take all necessary and legal steps to secure a war referendum constitutional amendment.

Important Resolutions. Two important resolutions have been submitted. One signed by representatives of all railroad organizations, directs the executive council "to assist the recognized railroad labor organizations by every effort within their power to have legislation enacted providing for government ownership and democratic operation of the transportation systems of the United States."

SLIGHT ADVANCE IN STRAWBERRY PRICES

Retail at 16c to 20c, and Wholesale 15c to 17c Per Box.

Large supplies of strawberries on the local market. Twenty-five found the housewife unprepared to receive them, with the result that on Thursday, load after load went like hot cakes. The wholesale quotations advanced 1 1/2 to 2c, and retail 1c to 1 1/2c, while they retained at 16c to 20c. One local dealer paid 20c a crate, wholesale, but they were of extra good quality.

Eggs took a slight drop, selling at 28c and 29c, retail, and 20c and 21c, wholesale. The butter market is still firm. Although there is a big supply of all garden products, no change in price is noticeable.
