ST. THOMAS, Aug. 8.—The privilege allowed the farmers in the older districts of the county of purchasing cattle on the highways is being shut out by the coming of the provincial good roads. HALIFAX, N. It is reported that the crew have abandoned the ship and are on the way to Halifax. Five minutes after the vessel struck she had to be abandoned. There was water in her engine room and heavy seas were breaking over her aft. The Lady of Gaspe, a vessel of 1,257 gross tons, was owned and operated by the Nova Scotia Steamship Company of Halifax. Her holds were almost half full of cargo, mostly from Newfoundland.

MUST PAY UP OR GO INTO COURT

Out of the 214 persons believed to have been aboard, 167 have been saved. The records of the purser went down with the ship, and the exact loss of life never has been known. The purser so far knows that several passengers have been rescued whose names did not appear on the company's list of passengers and crew carried at Portland, Oregon, the city of departure.

TOMATOES PLENTIFUL, PRICES DROP 15 CENTS
Thimbleberries Only Small Fruit Offered at Tuesday's Market.
Tomatoes were the only vegetables that showed a change in price on the market today, dropping from 65c and 90c to 50c and 75c for 11-quart baskets. Onions opened 1/2 higher at 42c. Demand was fairly good. Other vegetables were not so plentiful, and prices remained unchanged. Black and red currants are off the market, and the only small fruit offered for sale was thimbleberries, and these were sold for unchanged figures at 27c and 30c to 25c retail, and from 25c and 25c to 23c wholesale. It is expected that wheat will be off the market by Saturday. Five loads of hay were sold on Monday, and up until 5:30 this morning only four loads were offered. Prices remain unchanged, although there is a good demand. No oats or wheat have been offered since last Friday. Apples, pears, plums and peaches are in demand, at the available offerings do not seem to be enough to fill the wants of the housewives, although the country offerings were only moderate. REPORTERS BARRED.
TORONTO, Aug. 8.—Following the formal speeches of welcome given by provincial and federal officials this morning to the Brotherhood of Railway Car-men, the delegates swung into business this afternoon with all doors of Masses Hall most carefully closed. Newspapermen who effected an entrance had just time to glance around before they were politely ordered outside. It is against the rules to smoke in the hall and, as railwaymen are heavy smokers, the sidewalk outside Masses Hall. Shutters were crowded all afternoon with delegates out for the odd puff. From this it was learned that the early part of the afternoon was spent in calling the roll. Martin Ryan, grand general president of Kansas City, presided this morning. In his speech, President Ryan recalled that when he was in Toronto in 1909 his organization was fighting to get into the International American Federation of Labor. "We were a small organization then, but now we are making our way to Chicago soon to America presenting 250,000 railwaymen." T. C. Cashen, president of the switchmen in his remarks referring to wage cuts, said: "I am fearful, if something is not done to compose the situation, that something is going to happen." He said he was going to Chicago to meet the heads of the western roads. "We received no satisfaction," Mr. Cashen stated. "We are going to Chicago soon to meet the heads of the western roads."
