

W. P. TELFORD, JR., IS CHOICE OF N. GREY

Well-Known Owen Sound Lawyer Given Unanimous Vote.

OWEN SOUND, Oct. 12.—W. P. Telford, Jun., a prominent and popular lawyer of Owen Sound, and former partner of the late Hon. A. G. McKay, was unanimously chosen as Liberal candidate in North Grey by a comparatively large convention in Meaford this afternoon. There were only two names brought before the convention, W. P. Telford, Jun., and E. J. Cropper of Owen Sound. The latter withdrew in Mr. Telford's favor, making his nomination unanimous. Mr. Telford asked for time to consider the matter, and the convention was adjourned to meet in Owen Sound on Monday, Oct. 24. A routing address was given by Fred P. Parson, M.P., West Lambton, on the political question of greatest moment at the present time. He absolutely denied the repeated assertion by Government oratorical swashbucklers that the Liberals were a free trade party, and showed that a tariff for revenue was a necessity. He also attacked the Government on its railway policy and its lack of care in expenditures. Mr. Buchanan of Ravenshoe spoke briefly. He also felt that an effort should be made to bring the

Former Simcoe Teacher and Man of Many Parts Dies in Port Huron.

SIMCOE, Oct. 12.—G. B. McIntosh, former editor of the Barrie Advance, and 50 years ago a teacher in Simcoe, died yesterday in Port Huron, according to word received today by Mayor Dr. W. A. McIntosh. Mr. McIntosh, who was in his 48th year, had a varied career. He was successively American consul in Jamaica, Japanese propagandist in California, a writer on the New York Times, piano salesman and inventor. He was one of the finest script writers on the continent. His second wife was a daughter of Bishop Liggett of Honolulu. According to reports he died destitute.

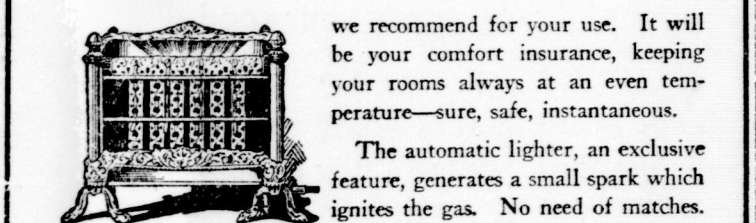
