

Commons Endorses Senate Reform Plan:: Government Ownership of Mines Urged

PROVINCES WILL SHARE IN MOVE FOR REFORM

All Other Plans For Changing Constitution of Upper House Are Down As Government Scheme Is Carried by Majority of 80—Vote Is 120 to 32.

CONSERVATIVES TRY HARD TO BLOCK MOVE

Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, March 9.—The Mackenzie King government won an outstanding victory in the House of Commons tonight, its policy as to Senate reform being endorsed by the remarkable majority of 88. With a vote of 120 to 32 the House rejected substitute methods of dealing with the Senate, and confirmed the government's proposal of calling a conference between the dominion government and the governments of the provinces.

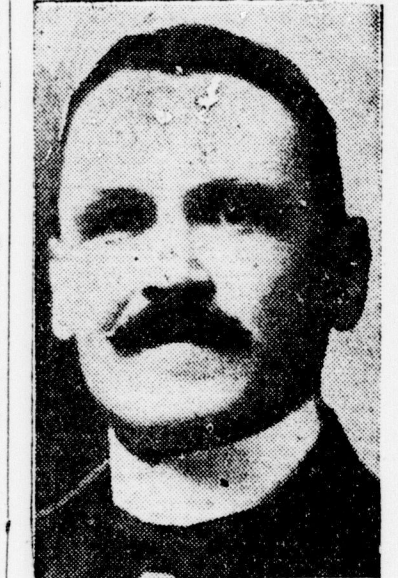
The Conservatives as a body, with the exception of W. F. MacLean, confirmed constitution reformer, opposed the government. The Progressives, with the exception of a handful of those impatient of constitutional methods, supported it.

Meighen failed to have the vote overruled on a technicality, but was overruled by the speaker.

The result is the same as in the case of Good's proposal to abolish racetrack gambling. It is an endorsement of government policy in advance of its initiation.

Shaw of Calgary frankly did not propose to get anywhere with his resolution setting forth that the Senate, as at present constituted, was not in the best interests of Canada. All he wanted was an opportunity to air his advanced views as to the incapacity and inequity of the Upper House. But another of his group, Findlay of Bruce, was not satisfied with that. He offered an amendment requiring that a request be presented to the imperial parliament for the granting of authority to the Canadian parliament to either make the Senate elective or to abolish it.

This being in direct opposition to the views of the government's expressed on the occasion of W. F. MacLean's recent resolution, it received no support on the Liberal side. Instead, Denis of Joliette, moved that it be expedient to call a conference between the dominion and provincial governments on the question. This was just what the ministry had proposed in its speech from the throne and explained on the MacLean resolution. It was endorsed.

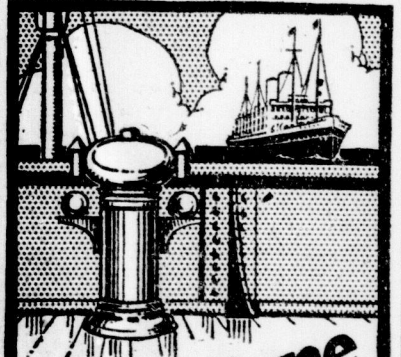

BLAME PLACED ON OPERATORS

Local Labor Men See Government Ownership as Solution to N. S. Troubles.

Government ownership, in the opinion of London labor men, is the only permanent solution of the trouble at the British Empire Steel Company's plant in Nova Scotia.

"The dominion government has put in more than \$90,000,000 in subsidies toward that plant in Nova Scotia," said Arthur Mould, president of the London branch of the Canadian Labor party, today, "and the cheapest way to handle that situation is to have government ownership. For years the company has demonstrated that it is incapable of dealing with its miners or conducting its business in a businesslike way. As long as the same management is left in control there will never, in my opinion, be any permanent change for the better. The very attitude of the executives of the company at the present time proves that."

Labor men justify their opinion to some extent on the fact that now the general public is beginning to take a broader view of the situation.

It's not simply labor men who are up in arms at the way the company is handling those mines," says Mr. Mould, "it is a large part of the general public. Today you will find scathing and condemnatory articles in many of the best magazines and newspapers in the dominion from coast to coast. That shows that we are not taking a biased view of conditions there."

In dealing with the British Empire Steel Corporation, Ottawa has been unwarrantably lax. It has remained quiescent when it should have taken action, and is largely responsible for the present conditions of affairs."

Will Play Off With London Life For Title.

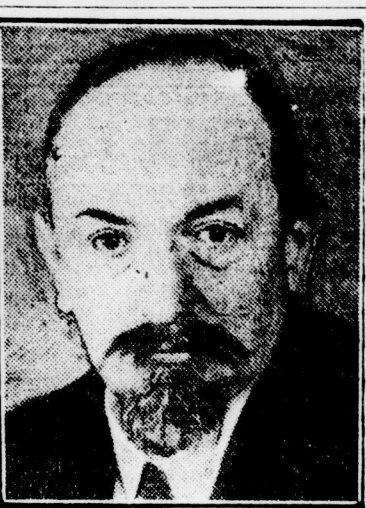

WILLING TO ESTABLISH VACATION BIBLE CLASS

St. Andrew's Ready To Support School in City During Summer.

St. Andrew's Sunday school expressed its willingness to establish and support a vacation Bible school in the city during the summer months at the meeting last night of the executive of the London religious education council.

Rev. W. R. McIntosh, president of the council, and his executive are anxious to see at least four such schools opened this year in well selected centers in the city. Last year it operated two on Hill street with fine results.

In discussing this type of school and its work, the executive says it is not merely an experiment, that it has worked out in practice, and claim the following benefits from its use: 1. It is a valuable educational factor in the annual program of the council; 2. It is specially adapted to reach children otherwise untouched by Sunday school work; 3. It is successful as a co-ordination method; 4. It is an effective evangelistic force when efficient leaders are in charge.

In arranging details of the work to be carried out this year it was decided to open the schools from 9 to 11:30 each morning for six or seven weeks in the summer months.

CONVENTION TO DEAL WITH LONDON IDEAS

Resolutions Introduced by the Local Branch Will Be Submitted at Toronto.

When the Ontario section of the dominion Labor party meets in convention on April 10 and 11 in Toronto it will deal with several resolutions introduced by the London branch. Last Sunday, the London branch drew up resolutions asking the dominion party to take a definite stand and make a public pronouncement of its official opinion on all national questions. Another asks for guidance as to the position of the Labor party where joint constituencies exist, and another with the position of the party in regard to future wars.

In the matter of joint constituencies London is particularly interested in view of the new constituency of East Middlesex and the city "annex." Here Labor is not in a position to return its own candidate without the aid of another party, unless there are three party candidates standing. In the immediate case of London it is considered quite likely by local politicians that there will be a Liberal, a Liberal and a Conservative standing. The Conservative may possibly be a broad-minded nominee who calls himself a "protectionist Liberal" or a "low tariff" Tory, but in any case he would lose Labor's support in this constituency.

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COUNTY DRIVE ON BORER TO COMMENCE MARCH 16

The Middlesex county drive on the corn borer will get under way on March 16, when two meetings a day will be held in various parts of the county for five days.

"Final arrangements as to where the meetings will be held have not yet been completed," stated J. F. Andrews, of the department of agriculture, this morning. "We are waiting to hear from several villages regarding the renting of town halls, and until this information is available we cannot announce times and places."

FARMERS ARE WARNED AGAINST OVERLOADING

High Constable and Engineer Make Tour of Roads in Middlesex.

Six farmers drawing milk to cheese factories were warned by High Constable Wharton and County Engineer Talbot yesterday that they must not overload the wagons when drawing milk to the factories.

The engineer and the high constable spent most of the day driving over county roads checking up on traffic and issuing orders to road foremen regarding the enforcement of the loaded vehicles act, which states that during the month of March trucks and wagons must be loaded to but half their capacity to meet the requirements of the law.

Gasoline and oil trucks have been the worst offenders in the past and a close watch will be kept on them for the balance of the month.
