Chick Evans Only Amateur In First Field of Four To Stay.

Inwood, N. Y., July 9—Gene Sarazen, golf wizard of Briarcliffe Lodge, turned the difficult Inwood Country Club course twice today in 148 strokes, the lowest card of any of the eighteen, led a field of ninety and qualified for the 1923 United States national open championship, to be played Friday and Saturday. The field was the first of four who will attempt to qualify. Sarazen had a 73 in the morning, and 75 in the afternoon. Those who negotiated the 36 holes in 160 today won places in the final 72 hole plan.
