SATOLLI'S PREFERMENT.

Rome, Oct. 19.—Information from the Vatican makes it possible to give details about the cardinalate to be given Mgr. Satolli and the retirement of Mgr. Satolli's secretary, Father Papi, from the Vatican staff.

months' ago Father Papi applied for his exit. The request contemplated a retirement from official connections with the Vatican foreign service and the prospective honors it had in store for him. It was made known that he desired to retire from the world and devote his life to the Jesuit order. To this and he went.
