Before the fire was out, Chief Dessy entered with a lantern and as he was passing from the front room to the middle one he stepped upon the dead body of a man. The body lay upon its face the clothing entirely burned off the back, only the boots on the feet and a few shreds of underclothing remaining on the charred and blackened corpse.
