CRAZY DOUKHOBORS.

Good Chance of Their Perishing in March Along Railway.

Winnipeg, Sept. 28.—A telegram sent by the C. P. R. to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Premier Roblin today indicates the pleasant position of the wandering Doukhobors. They have been given every chance to return to their homes near Yorkton, but have refused, and a warning note has now been sounded by the railway. What action will be taken here is hard to say, but the wanderers apparently care not for hardships or what may happen them.

The following is the telegram sent by the railway people to the Doukhobors: "Party of forty Doukhobors, Kenora, and party of forty-four at White-mouth, Manitoba, are on the railway track to Montreal. With the heavy traffic on the railway there is a possibility of their meeting with an accident from being run over in the interests of humanity our officers used every endeavor to dissuade them from the undertaking. As a last resort they were arrested for trespassing and fined thirty dollars. They are now proceeding along the railway. With the sparse population around Lake Superior, the cold winter coming on, and the danger resulting from walking on the track, some action should be taken at once. We offered to take them back to Yorkton, but they persist in their march along the track."

KOOTENAY MEN CHEER MR. BORDEN

Splendid Meeting Assembles at Nelson to Hear His Address

MANY FROM OTHER POINTS

Premier McBride's Utterances on Better Terms Heartily Applauded

Nelson, Sept. 28.—The opera house was crowded to the doors tonight when R. L. Borden, M.P., leader of the Conservative party in the Dominion, made his address. Premier Richard McBride, J. G. H. Bergeron, M.P., and Dr. Reid, M.P. for Grenville, were the other speakers.

The party arrived at six p.m. by special train, coming via Nakus and Skeena Lake. Large deputations arrived from Rossland, Kaslo, the Boundary country, East Kootenay, and indeed from all the neighboring districts, and Mr. Borden and his party were accorded a warm and enthusiastic reception in and out of the opera house on Tuesday.

The party will stay here tomorrow, and will visit the Boundary country on Monday, going to Cranbrook on Tuesday.

Mr. McBride, who spoke first at the meeting, dealt with the question of better terms for the Kootenays, and made it clear that it would be the party slogan in the next campaign. The premier repeated the statements recently made by him at the coast regarding Asiatic immigration. His address was well received.

Mr. Borden made the address of the evening, and was frequently interrupted by applause. He spoke with more animation than on his former visit in 1902, and as the Daily News, Liberal, and other papers have reported, he made a more favorable impression. By the great audience he was listened to with the utmost attention, and was given an ovation on taking his seat.

Mr. Borden praised Premier McBride for his strong stand for better terms, and approved his withdrawal from Ottawa conference. He pointed out a reply into the hands of the Kootenays, if returned to power. The speaker repeated his statement of the fact that the construction of the international railway is a matter of vital importance to the Kootenays, and that the government should have been more liberal in the proper course to adopt. Mr. Bergeron, who spoke next, and fairly captured the audience by his remarks, the audience applauding the French-Canadian victory at the close of his address.

The meeting closed at 11 p.m., and a later reception was held.

BOY MALTREATED.

Captain and Mate of Barque Punished for Cruelty.

Bonaventure, Que., Sept. 27.—Captain Christensen of the Norwegian barque Agat was fined \$100, and the first mate of the same vessel was fined \$100 and sentenced to three months' imprisonment for cruelty to a young German boy on board the barque. The boy was found one morning tied to a ring bolt on deck. Both hands and feet were tied and he could scarcely move. He was kept in this position for days. It is alleged that the only food handed him consisted of burned crusts and water. The boy says the deck tramped his head against the deck until it had driven him mad. On another occasion the boy was bound, and a rope was attached to him, he was lowered over the side of the vessel and dipped several times into the water until he was more dead than alive. Baring his neck and shoulders, he showed the statements recently made by him that he had been maltreated with red hot irons.
