washington, March 16.—The people of New Zealand want the Atlantic battleships in command of Admiral Evans to visit this island on their way around the world. An invitation extended by the premier of New Zealand was reported at the state department today. It would be an easy diversion from the direct route for the battleships from the harbor of Pago-Pago on the way to Sydney from Melbourne, but whether that will be done will depend on the discretion of the navy department.

CASCADE PLACES BEACONS

Marine Department's Chartered Steamer Returned From Nanaimo and Sechelt

The steamer Cascade, Capt. H. Brown, which is engaged under charter to the marine department, was in port yesterday from Sechalt, where an acetylene beacon was placed on White rock. A similar harbor light was established at Nanaimo. The Cascade will leave today for Active pass and Lewis rock. On the latter danger, off Oak bay, a beacon will be constructed on the foundation recently made by the steamer's crew.
