BAD FINANCE AND BUDGET HAS ITEMS MIDDLE-HEADED SOCIALISM FOR MARKS IN B. C.

Characterization of Budget By Mr. Balfour at Manchester Last Night—Mr. Chaplin Says Adjust Road Duties

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 18.—In his speech last night at Manchester, Mr. Balfour speaking of the budget, said it was a combination of bad finance and middle-headed Socialism. The method of dealing with licenses was abominable and unjust. The idea that the lot of any man could be improved by destroying private ownership of land was perfect folly. No man should be taxed according to the kind of property wherein his wealth happened to be invested. The issue raised by the budget could not be decided by the majority of 1908 whatever was going to take place.

U. S. GOVERNMENT SEIZES BLEACHED FLOUR

General Orders Issued to Commandeer All Such Cereal and Flour Millers Disobey Injunction.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 18.—Open defiance by millers of the United States government's warning to cease the manufacture of bleached flour on pain of seizure, has led the secretary of agriculture to take drastic action. An order has been issued by Secretary Wilson to the department of agriculture to seize all of the bleached flour in the country and information has been received that as a result of that action fourteen consignments were taken in the West yesterday.

NINETEEN HURT IN TRAIN SNAKE

BY SMITH, Ark., Nov. 18.—Nineteen persons were injured but none fatally when a southbound passenger train No. 10 of the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad was wrecked at Rogers, sixty miles north of here yesterday. Spreading rails caused the accident.

LONDON, Ont., Wants Sunday Census

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—Premier Whitney today refused the request of a London deputation that the government declare London's population by Sunday census without calling for a census. The deputation, which was headed by Charles White and Frings, claimed that the figures of the assessment roll was about 500 less than the real population.
