LOCAL ITEMS OF INTEREST

News Notes of Town and Country Happenings Gathered by Graphic Reporters.

CONGRATULATIONS

The town's visit to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Miller on Wednesday morning and rejoicings are there over the arrival of a baby girl.

SLIGHT MISHAP

On Tuesday a slight break was observed on the main boom, between two of the top piers. About 1500 logs were with the high wind were carried right out to the bay.

APRIL RECORD

The I. C. R. has begun the fiscal year by breaking all records. April is the first month of the fiscal year and during last April the I. C. R. earnings totalled \$1,006,000, which is more than was earned during the previous April and is more than the road ever earned in one month.

CURFEW

It has been decided that Fredericton will return to the curfew bell system as in former times. The city clerk has been instructed to prepare a by-law dealing with the matter. When the law is in force all children found on the streets after nine o'clock at night in summer or eight o'clock in winter will be reported to the police court and dealt with.

NEW COMET DISCOVERED

Dr. Hansen, the Danish astronomer, notified the Greenwich Observatory tonight that the tail of a comet of intense magnitude was observed at 2 a. m., May 10, in the constellation Cygnus. The comet has since been located by the Greenwich Observatory and is now visible every night through telescopes.

SUNDAY TRAINS

Hon. Mr. Cochrane says that beginning with the summer schedule the I. C. R. will run trains daily, including Sundays, between Halifax and Montreal. No change is proposed in this respect between St. John and Halifax. The reason for the daily service is that the I. C. R. must fall into line with the other railways and that the traffic demands seven trains a week.
