ON LAST LAP OF HIS TOUR THROUGH B. C.

Hon. Mackenzie King Addresses Audiences Dealing With Financial Policy.
Cranbrook, B. C. Oct. 19.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King spent Thanksgiving Day on the final lap of his tour through British Columbia. He arrived here early last evening and his party ate their Thanksgiving dinner as the guests of Hon. Dr. King, Provincial Minister of Public Works and a number of prominent Liberals of the city and district, who had gathered to honor the head of the Liberal Party and his lieutenants.

At last evening's meeting, Mr. King was supported by W. C. Kennedy, M. P. for North Essex, and E. A. Lapointe, M. P. for Quebec East. Mr. King confined himself to a criticism of the financial policy and methods of the present administration at Ottawa. One of the causes of the present unrest was the extravagance in national methods of government, he said. He pointed to the fact that commissions without number are appointed and stated that during the present tour of British Columbia the sleeping car in which Mr. King and his party were travelling, was either sandwiched between or hitched behind a long array of private cars carrying various government officials about the country, an enormous expense to the taxpayers, who are looking for relief and not for additional burdens.

FRENCH MINERS DEMAND INCREASE

Members of National Council of Federation to Meet in Paris.
Paris, Oct. 19.—Members of the National Council of the French Miners' Federation will meet here Oct. 22nd to consider demands for an immediate advance in wages. The rate to be demanded is as yet unknown, but it is understood to vary between four and five francs per day. It is indicated the companies will be given a very brief time in which to answer and that in case of refusal a strike will be called.

Aeroplane Took Fire One Thousand Feet in the Air.

CORBIN, Ky., Oct. 16.—Captain Beavers, pilot, and I. H. Conolley, machinist, members of the Barbourville, Ky. Aero Club, fell 1,000 feet in a burning airplane, near here yesterday afternoon, but escaped injury. The aviators, who were en route to Lexington, leaped from their machine as it approached the ground. The plane landed just as the engine exploded. Captain Beavers was former ace in the British flying squadron.

DECLARATION POSTPONED

Returns From Eldon Not in—Declaration Will Be Held Friday.

Friday was declaration day in Restigouche. Sheriff Craig opened his court at Dalhousie at two o'clock and assembled the returns. Messrs. Arthur T. LeBlanc and S. S. Harrison, the government candidates; Hon. C. H. LaBelle and W. D. Duncan, the two independent government candidates, and David A. Stewart and Henry Diotte, the successful opposition candidates were present. G. Carle Lozan, St. John, and J. Allen LeBlanc, Dalhousie, were also present for the opposition candidates. With one poll missing the vote stand: LeBlanc, 1,639; Harrison, 1,632; LaBelle, 1,566; Duncan, 1,440; Stewart, 2,112; and Diotte, 1,683. The missing poll, which is Eldon, according to the unofficial returns, gives LeBlanc, 15; Harrison 14; LaBelle 24; Duncan 24; Stewart 87, and Diotte 80. During the count it was discovered that one poll in Durham gave Diotte ninety more votes than the unofficial returns. The sheriff adjourned his court until Friday next at 2 p.m. when the returns from the Eldon poll will be counted and Messrs. Stewart and Diotte, opposition, will be declared elected.

Hon. Arthur Coulligan was elected chairman and speeches were delivered by all the candidates in both English and French. The speakers thanked the electors for their support.

Wireless Telephones and Telegraphy Advocated for Opening Up Country.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Wireless telephones, wireless telegraphy as well as aeroplanes would do more to open up Labrador than any other mode of means of communication, according to Dr. Wilfrid T. Grenfell, the celebrated doctor-missionary of Labrador. Dr. Grenfell stated here to-day that lack of communication during the winter months was one of the greatest drawbacks of the country. Aeroplanes have been successfully flown over portions of Labrador and aviators claim that the country is dotted with natural aerodromes. Wireless telephony and telegraphy also would be a great boon for the residents in the outlying districts of the country.

BRAKEMAN FOURNIER KILLED WEDNESDAY

Fell Under Train at Tide Head and Succumbed to Injuries Received.

A most distressing accident occurred on Wednesday morning at 5:30 at Tide Head in which Mr. J. R. Fournier, son of Mr. F. Fournier, was killed. Val Brabant was the victim. Mr. Fournier was brakeman on the train which was passing at the rate of four miles an hour, set off upon the platform and slipped under the train. Both legs were cut off, the right between ankle and knee and the left between knee and thigh. The train was brought to Campbellton and removed to the Tide Head hospital where everything possible was done for him, but without avail, passing away at 8:30 some three hours after the accident.

The train was in charge of Conductor J. DesChamps with Engineer J. R. McKenzie at the throttle. Deceased who was in his 23rd year was highly regarded and much esteemed and the news of his untimely death will be heard with feelings of deep regret by a large circle of friends.
