

REGULAR QUARTERLY
MEETING OF PRESBYTERY

The regular quarterly meeting of the Presbytery of Miramichi was held in the Hall of St. John's church, Chatham, on Tuesday. There were present—Revs. D. Henderson, Alex. Rattie, S. J. MacArthur, Geo. Tattler, F. L. Jobb, G. A. Grant, Alex. Firth, L. P. LaBel, J. G. A. Colquhoun, Walter Matthews, J. R. Miller, Rev. Dr. Cummings, Rev. John Valentine and Rev. L. A. Grant were associated with the Presbytery.

In the unavoidable absence of the Moderator, who was a passenger on board a much overdue train, Rev. George Tattler was appointed Moderator pro tem.

Rev. Alex. Firth, Acting Clerk, having declined to let his name be put in nomination, Rev. Alex. Rattie was on motion of Rev. Mr. Matthews unanimously elected to fill the vacancy in the Clerkship, caused by the resignation of Rev. E. E. Mowatt last December.

Rev. Walter Matthews presented the Home Mission report. Four Mission stations, viz. Doaktown, Kouchibouguac, Milbank and New Bandon would be given, if possible, the services of ordained ministers during the coming summer, and application would be made to the Assembly's Home Mission Committee for seven catechists. Rev. John Valentine received the appointment to Kouchibouguac for a year.

Rev. G. A. Grant, Convener, submitted the report of the Augmentation Committee. The usual grants would be asked for Harcourt, Escuminac, Que., and Matapedia. Provisional arrangements were made for securing a grant for New Carlisle, Bass River and Millerton. The Presbytery passed a resolution urging that all the congregations within the bounds (to whom it might apply) respect the deliverance of the last General Assembly by which the minimum stipend of ministers was raised to \$1000 and a manse. All the ordained ministers in the Home Mission fields will henceforth receive a salary of \$1000 per year.

On motion of Rev. Alex. Rattie, Revs. Alex. Firth, L. Beaton, L. P. LaBel, F. L. Jobb, ministers, and Messrs. Joseph Henderson, Alex. MacKinnon, John Williamson, R. N. Weeks, elders, were appointed Commissioners to the General Assembly and on the motion of Rev. Mr. Henderson the Rev. D. D. MacLeod, D. D., Ont., was unanimously nominated for the Moderatorship of Assembly.

Standing committees for the year were appointed with the following Conveners, who will also be the Presbytery's representatives on the corresponding General Assembly Committees—Foreign Missions, Rev. George Tattler; Statistics, the Clerk; Sunday Schools, Rev. J. F. McCurdy; Augmentation, Rev. G. A. Grant; Social Service and Evangelism, Rev. F. L. Jobb; Young People's Societies, Rev. S. J. MacArthur.

Rev. F. L. Jobb presented the report of the Committee that was appointed to revise the advanced copy of the proposed new Book of Praise. After discussing the report, the Presbytery resolved to ask the Assembly to take no further action in connection with the matter till the present financial stringency under which the country is suffering, owing to the war, is relieved.

port on Statistics. There were 2350 families within the bounds, and 4500 communicants. The Presbytery had been asked to raise \$10,000 for the Budget, but of this amount only \$5850 had been received by the Agent of the Church. The congregation of Bathurst alone had raised the full amount of the allocation. Mr. Matthews on being asked how they succeeded in raising the full amount, answered—"We simply made an effort to do it."

Rev. Alex. Rattie reported for Sunday Schools and Young People Societies. There were 118 Sunday Schools, and many of them in active operation all the year. The Sunday Schools of the New Mills congregation had given \$171 for Missions. Young People's Societies were flourishing in many of the congregations—notably at Black River and Loggieville. Mr. Rattie complained of the neglect of ministers to forward returns to him. He had sent out blank forms in December but only about 60 per cent had been returned. So that his report after all, was practically worthless. A similar grievance was experienced by Rev. F. L. Jobb in connection with the Social Service and Evangelism blank forms.

The Clerk tabled a call from Clyde and Barrington, N. S., in favor of Rev. G. A. Grant, Black River, and Presbytery agreed to meet in St. Stephen's church there, on the 23rd inst. to hear representatives of the congregation at Black River and to dispose of the call.

Rev. Walter Matthews reported that, since the last meeting, the church at Bathurst had been totally destroyed by fire. The congregation was, however, planning to build a new and more commodious church, and he asked

Numbers Twenty-two Men Enlisted for Third Contingent

The recruits recently enrolled here for the Third Contingent are undergoing four hours drill each day under the command of Color-Sergeant Arseneau while they are awaiting orders to proceed to a mobilization point.

They are a fine looking lot of young men and are sure to be a credit to the County. They may be seen for a few hours each day going through the rudiments of drill on the vacant land in the rear of W. J. Kent & Co's store, or taking marches through the streets of the town and outlying sections. They have as yet not been supplied with uniforms or equipment, so that they do not present a very martial appearance, but they look as though they meant business, and the enemy will have tough nuts to crack when they face them in the trenches. For the present they are quartered at the Landry Hotel and are receiving pay regularly from the Militia Department. Here are their names. ALLIES PREPARING
FOR GRAND ADVANCE

Large British and French Armies with Ammunition Being Gathered

Paris, March 16—Vast French and British armies are about to begin a general offensive. The "Forward" order will be given as soon as the fields are dry and artillery can be moved over them. The French have assembled vast quantities of munitions so that a vigorous offensive can be carried on for two or three months.

London, March 15—The Germans feel keenly the victory of the British over them at Neuve Chapelle, and are fighting fiercely to recover the lost territory, putting forth every effort to retrieve recent losses. Another great battle is expected at this point.

GERMAN CRUISER
DRESDEN SUNK

Caught Sunday by British Squadron and Surrendered—Crew Was Saved.

London, March 15—The German cruiser Dresden, which has been causing such havoc among allied shipping in the South Pacific, was cornered Sunday by the British squadron off Juan Fernandez island. After five minutes battle she pulled down her flag, but was in such condition from British fire she went down. The crew was rescued, fifteen of them being badly wounded. There were no British casualties.
